

As Europe goes, so goes U.S.



Basile, who rates raves this year, will introduce his collection locally this week including viyella pegged pants, a matching tunic and shirt.

The early 1970s marked the opening of a new era in the history of Italian fashion, with the emergence of the house of Basile and the birth and success of the Milan ready-to-wear showings.

In the spring of '71, Aldo Ferrante, the president of Basile, took a dramatic step. Instead of showing in Florence, as was customary, he decided to debut the Basile collection in Milan. And thus began the movement toward the creation of Milan as a world fashion center.

As a signature, the name Basile originated with a tailor by the same name who owned a men's atelier. When Ferrante acquired the Basile concern, he retained the name but began transforming it into a forward-fashion house of men's wear.

Under his guidance, the Basile name became synonymous with sophisticated styling and elegant fabrics in men's wear. Amplifying his successful formula, Ferrante went on to create a Basile line for women, based upon the fashion principles of Basile men's wear.

Like her male counterpart, the Basile woman is young and sophisticated—a fashion leader. She enjoys wearing suits. But, as Ferrante commented, "Suits are the bread of my collection, but one cannot live on bread alone." Thus his fall/winter '78 col-

lection transcends the traditional suit. "The art of dressing can only survive when there is total freedom in assembling one's wardrobe, creating contrasts and combinations where they never existed before," says Ferrante.

AT A TRUNK showing at Hattie in Birmingham this week, Ferrante's Basile line of ready-to-wear will focus on the concept of "contrasts," which mixes shape and fabrics in a new way.

Pleated coats, accessorized with panne velvet scarves, are worn with fresh white gardenias in the lapels. Shorter blazers with softly padded shoulders are worn on top of anything and everything—from leather skirts to printed satin pants.

Trendsetting buffalo hide and shearing offer a new look to vests and jackets—both worn over skimpy satin cigarette pants. Kid leather is printed to simulate the unique grain of ostrich for skirts, trousers and blazers—always paired with rich satins.

The collection highlights the shimmering silhouette created by slightly padded shoulders in blazers and coats which top narrow ankle-length cigarette pants. The ever-present tunic is gently wrapped at the hip. Blazers are shorter and single-breasted. Trousers are pleated and cuffed. Ferrante replaces the boot with very narrow

straight leg cigarette pants layered under both tunics and dresses for day and evening.

Shiny panne velvet, once reserved for evening, now appears in skirts and scarves for day. Satin, too, emerges for daytime wear—worn under tweed blazers, pin-striped suits, pleated coat cloths. In the evening, the satin is printed with flowers.

The look of piled wool is the newest

looking fabric used in coats, blazers, pants and tunics. To complete his look, Ferrante adds "reporter" hats in panne velvet, felt or pillied wool. School bags and shorter shoulder strap pouches become a must.

During the day, low-heeled men's oxfords are worn with thick wool stockings. For evening, lace T-strap shoes or high-heeled leather pumps are worn with fishnet stockings.

Italian gala set for arts

Southfield artists in Art in the Park

Mary Murphy Reed's serigraph prints and stained glass by Virtu Studio, both Southfield entries, will be featured at Art in the Park on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 16 and 17 in Stain Park, Birmingham.

The show is Common Ground's fourth annual exhibition and will star some 120 juried artists in the fair. Top flight artists from this area and throughout the country will exhibit a variety of art media including prints, sculpture, jewelry, photography, weaving, ceramics, stained glass, blown glass and soft sculptures.

Special attractions will include a children's art area, ethnic food booths and free entertainment from 11 a.m. until 7 p.m., both days. Sponsored by Friends of Common Ground, Art-in-the-Park is rated one of the top regional art fairs in the midwest by "Sunshine Artists Magazine."
