Variety is featured  
for the fall season

An adult Great Books discussion group will meet this year at the Farmington Hills Library, 32737 Twelve Mile.

If you enjoy reading, this group is for you. There is no pressure to discuss, just read the story, meet with the group twice a month and have fun listening to the various interpretations.

The group will read a series of traditional and modern short stories. This is a unifying theme throughout the stories called "the individual and society." This is a new format for "Great Books," so if you have been in a previous group this won't be a repetition of your past discussion.

Some of the authors whose works are included are Stephen Crane, Aron Chekhov, Lewis Leston, John Updike and Saul Bellow. The two volume paperback set of books will be available to purchase for \$12 at the library.

The first session will be on Thursday, Sept. 21 at 7:30 p.m. at the Twelve Mile Library. Call Carol Hund at 553-0300 for further information and registration.

Fall already. A gloomy thought to many. But to brighten the prospect, the Farmington Community Library will be offering program series for all ages, beginning in mid-September.

Beginning Sept. 15, interested 11-15-year-olds can register for "Babysitting Class" which will be at the Farm-

ington city branch. The class will meet on Monday evenings from 7-9 p.m., Oct. 2-23 and will be taught by a certified Red Cross instructor.

Especially for young adults, but of interest to all, will be an astronomy program, "The Universe—Stranger than Science Fiction," featuring speaker C.D. Marshall. The program will be held on Sept. 26, at 7 p.m. at the Farmington Hills library.

The adult book discussion at the city library is looking for new members. The group meets on alternate Thursday mornings at 10 a.m. to discuss popular books. This month's titles will be Ann Morrow Lindberg's "A Gift from the Sea," on Sept. 14; and "A Place to Come To," by Robert Penn Warren on Sept. 28.

At the Farmington Branch, preschoolers are invited to a fall festival on Sept. 26 at 2 p.m. Parents and children will experiment with various forms of falling during the activity hour.

At the Farmington Hills branch, "Thumbprint Art" will be the activity on Sept. 21 at 10:30 a.m. Participating preschoolers should wear old clothing and not be concerned about getting paint on themselves.

On Monday, Oct. 2 at 2 p.m., preschoolers can view fairy tale favorites on film, including Peter and the Wolf,

the Three Robbers and the Beast of Monsieur Kuchie.

For school age children, the library will have a Dr. Seuss film festival on Sept. 26 at the Farmington Hills Library. Featured will be the Cat in the Hat, Hooper Ebbot Highway and Green Eggs and Ham.

Sept. 15 will be the first day to register for five week programs, which will run from Sept. 25 to Oct. 26. Those interested must register in person from 9-11 a.m.

Offerings at the Farmington Branch will be "Leading through Nature," "Dr. Seuss," "Storyteller's Bag of Tricks," and "Alphabet Soup." The above programs are for pre-schoolers.

"Stone Soup" will be offered for first

and second graders. "Rediscover Senses" for grades three and four and "Creative Crafts" and "Readers Roundtable," for grades five and six.

The Farmington Hills Branch will offer "Storyteller's Bag of Tricks," Science for Tots," "Dr. Seuss Special," "Crafty Capers," and Kids Cooking," all for pre-schoolers.

Other activities offered are "Italian Language" for kindergarten through third grade; "Storybook Junction" for grades one and two; "Encyclopedia Brown Strikes Again" for third and fourth graders; and "Words and Pictures" and "Reader's Roundtable for grades five and six.

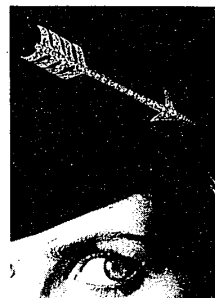

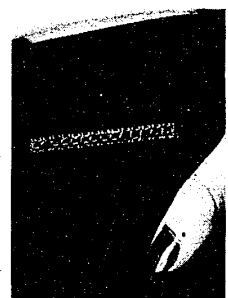

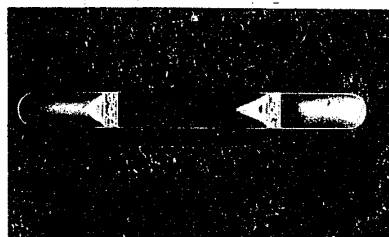
The Best Vest: golden curved bar pin with rhinestones, by Tancer and Two, '29.

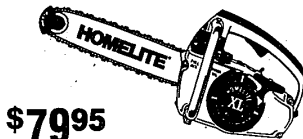
