M-275 study continues; choices will be narrowed

The State Highway Commission has a traffic analysis and is awaiting an environmental analysis on what, if anything, will be built in place of M-25.

"Hopefully, in our Sept. 27 meeting, we can narrow the choices," said Peter Fletcher, chairman of the four-man highway commission.

The commission is pondering four options: The original freeway plan through western Oakland County: a parkway plan with speeds of 35 m.p.h. proposed by county Commissioner tabert McConnell (RF-Armington Hills:) improvement of existing roads, proposed by Citizens in Opposition to M-Z6: and the null alternative idoing mithing.

Fletcher said the decision isn't entirely the highway commission's.

It was a devastating Interior Department analysis which originally sunk the M-275 free-way plan in 1977. Fletcher admits being frustrated authe "very complicated" and "politically inadequate" way the federal bureaucracy moves.

The federal agencies will only accept or reject a specific plan. Fletcher would like to lay down all four options before each agency and get some guidance about which way the state should move.

IF THE STAFF had its way, the state would go ahead and build M-275 from the intersection of the I-278 and 1:08 freeways on the Farmington Hills western border through to I-78 at Davisburg.
Otherwise the staff finds far fewer faults with McCornell's plan than with the Citizens in Opposition proposal. That emerges clearly from a staff report describing and analyzing the alternatives. It would continue on a reduced roadway to White Lake Road. It would be a six-lane boulevard with an 8-foot landscaped median, shoulders, continuous bicycle path and landscaped berns. One rail-road crossing would have a grade separation.

The Opppsition plan would be in two segments: The Haggerty-Union Lake-Williams Lake chain of roads from Twelve Mile north to M-59, and a six-lane boulevard along existing Four-

teen Mile from Haggerty to North-western Highway.

Estimated costs for the McCornell plan are 486 million to 439 million; of the Opposition plan, \$SI million to \$88 million.

THE McCONNEIL plan presented some problems to the highway engineers, but it got generally good marks. On the plus side, engineers said it would provide direct access to the massive intersection of 1275 and 1-686 on the border of Farmington Hills and Novi.

"The almost oxitimous curvilinear alignment has been developed to provide angles of crossing at intersections as near to 90 degrees as possible. This will provide optimum sight distance at intersections and minimum exposure to traffic crossing the boulevard," they wrote.

"A maximum speed of 45 mills perfour is the stated desire of the sporsors of this proposal. The frequent use of five degree curves in the alignment will tend to rechoe speeds on the facility."

Moreover, because the boulevard would be separate from existing roads, the capacities of such existing roads as Haggerty, Union Lake and Williams Lake would be increased.

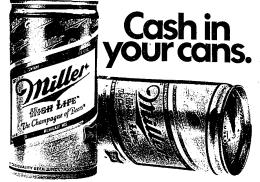
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
