DanceFit described as fun approach to physical fitness

DanceFit is the Farmington Area YMCA's newest class offered in its physical fitness program of total

physical fitness program of total exercise.

Kay Burns, a physical fitness specialist, describes the classes as "A combination of basic elements of a good fitness workout and the fun of dancing, giving women a fun annual dancing, giving women a fun approach to becoming fit. Fitness doesn't have to be a chore."


