Finns dance, sing, play in Juhla celebration

The Detroit Finnish Cultural Center will stage a special Finnish cultural afternoon, called "Juhla," a variety show of dance and music at 2 p.m. Sunday in the auditorium at 35220 Eight Mile, Farmington Hills.

On the program will be the Finlandia Male Chorus, directed by Evert Makinen, the Finlandia Strings, directed by Eero Keranen, and Hujakot, a Finnish folk dance group which performs colorful dances in folk costume, directed by Ruth Mannisto and accompanied by accordionist Ralph Mannisto.

The St. John Lutheran Octet will furnish some Finnish compositions. Soloists in the octet are Armas Suni, who plays the kantele, an ancient Finnish string instrument, and Jack Taipale who plays fiddle.

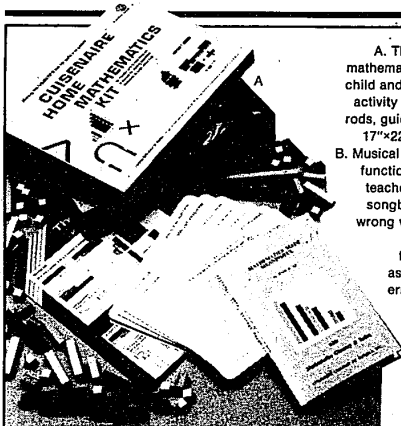
One of the highlights of the afternoon will be "Church Scene," a bi-centennial pageant directed and written by Eva Koskimaki, a Detroit librarian. The audience will be asked to join in singing some Finnish folk songs, and invited to sample some traditional Finnish refreshments.

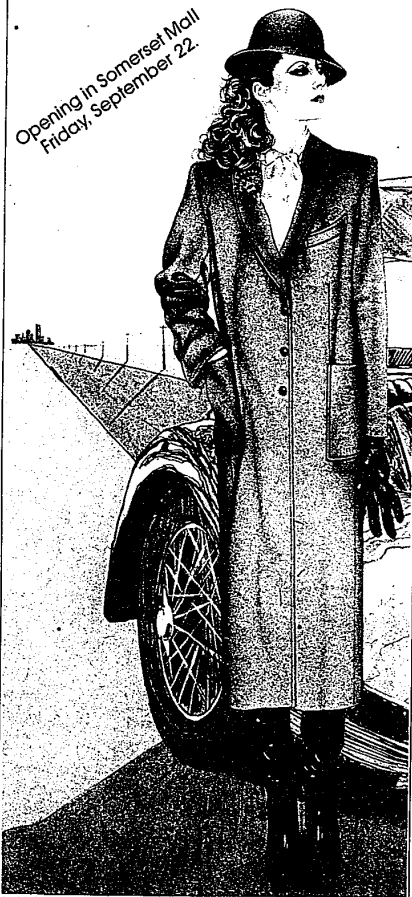
