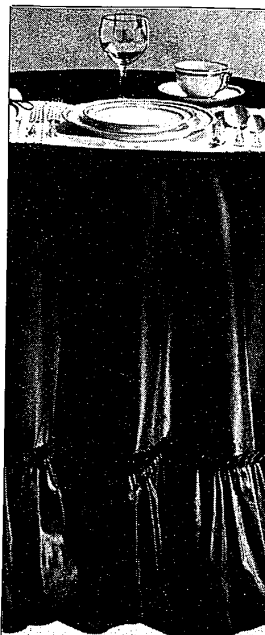

AAUW Book Sale

For book lovers and collectors

Farmington Branch of the American Association of University Women has scheduled its annual Used Book Sale for Sept. 21-24 in Livonia Mall. This will be the group's 26th sale of used books and the 11th consecutive year members have used Livonia Mall for the four day event.

The sale runs continuously during mail hours: 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Thursday through Saturday and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday. Money earned is earmarked for scholarships, community projects and support of Farmington Community Libraries.

The local branch boasts one of the biggest, and continually the most successful book sales in the state. There are approximately 10 tons of books for this year's sale.

The local branch, with 131 members,

contributed the second highest amount of money last year to the group's educational foundation, of all AAUW branches in the state.

THE BOOK SALE is always the group's largest fundraiser. When one sale ends, another begins with collecting, sorting, processing and packing. The categories include fiction, non-fiction, texts, collectables, children's literature, cooking, travel, medical and numerous paperbacks and magazines. The 1978 co-chairman for the event are Marjorie Conover and Evelyn Bibb.

For the second year, the group had volunteers to help coming from Community Living Centers and New Horizons, to move books from the Farmington Hills Community Library, where the books are collected, sorted and stored, to the mall.

The move provides an opportunity for young men to receive training, to gain satisfaction from a job well done and to serve the community. Staff from both organizations will supervise on moving day, and work along with the young men.

Another source of help this year came from Ray's Interiors, who provided a truck and a driver to move books from the library to the mall.

WITH THIS YEAR'S sale not yet

begun, plans are already under way for the 1979 sale. The only big change in the format is a switch of collection site, which will be Bond School, corner of Thirteen Mile and Orchard Lake. Books will be accepted there throughout the year with another committee lined up for sorting and processing.

All kinds of books are accepted and income tax receipts can be requested.

In appreciation for the use of Bond School, AAUW will give free books to teachers of Farmington Public Schools on Sunday, Sept. 24, between 9-5 p.m.

At the close of the sale, all unsold books will be given to Children's Children's Village.
