



## Dreamy car turns on teen

Mark Hamill, who was so bland in "Star Wars" he couldn't outact a couple of robots, has gone full tilt in the other direction. He now belongs to the "intense" school of acting. At least, "intensity" best sums up his characterization in "Corvette Summer" (PG).

The intensity doesn't derive from passionate concern about people, politics or saving the gray whale. Its focus is a car, a Corvette Stingray. As Kenny Dantley, Hamill plays a graduating high school senior who has rebuilt a wrecked Corvette that he saved from a junkyard crusher.

When the car is stolen, he goes in search of it. After a tip that it's in Las Vegas, he starts hitchhiking.

On the way, he gets a lift from Vanessa (Annie Potts). Vanessa drives a customized van with a waterbed in it.

She's a neophyte looking for Vegas to bolster her career. The two fall in love with each other. She hopes to become a high-priced call girl; he hopes to retrieve his car.

However, Vanessa would like to practice with Dantley, who seems to be more aroused by fiberglass bodies than real ones. She finally manages to ignite Dantley, although, the Corvette is clearly his first and original love.

THE MOVIE then is punctuated by lovers' spats and Corvette sightings. Dantley singlehandedly goes after the heavies—a gang of organized car thieves.

He can't remember his car's license number; still, he's sure that he's more capable of locating the Vette than the police.

Meanwhile, Vanessa is trying to launch her bumpy career. Annie Potts as Vanessa has so many different hair styles and looks that it's difficult to recognize her from one scene to the next.

We just have to go with Dantley and assume his instincts are correct and that he recognizes her probably some detail in her trim.

"Corvette Summer" clearly is a film aimed at the youth market, but parents with submers who want to see this PG-rated movie might think twice about it. The sex scenes aren't explicit, but references to Vanessa's career ambitions are.

The tone is glib and nonsensical, as if she were studying to become an engineer or a teacher. Many people will find this moralistic offensive, especially since it is wrapped in cuteness.

Hamill is cute because he is so boyish and so devoted to his car. Potts is cute because of the bumbling way she goes about her trade.

Together they are cute because they appear as not-too-bright but very earnest young people.

And if they get married and have a sequel, you can bet it will be even cuter.

For 34 weeks, beginning Oct. 7, Detroit Youtheatre will present its 14th "Something Every Saturday" season of live, professional musicals, puppet shows, specials and 25-cent movie matinees in the Detroit Institute of Arts auditorium.

Youtheatre's hour-long performances are designed for young people of specific age levels to ensure maximum enjoyment and appreciation of the live stage presentations.

On any Saturday at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. until the end of May 1979, families may see musical versions of "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer," "The Story of Harriet Tubman," "The Orphan Princess," "Hansel and Gretel," "Pinocchio" and three other favorites.

The eight puppet shows will include "Dragon Feathers" performed by Chicago's Melnik Puppet Theatre, "Witches' Brew" by fulltime airline pilot and part-time professional puppeteer Jim Gamble, "The Mysterious Masks of Africa" and "Peter Rabbit's Easter" to name a few.

SCHEDULED For Youtheatre's "Specials" are "David of Seesaw Street," the Ishangi Family of West Africa, Spanish dancers Olivera and del Moral who are back for a second season by popular demand, and the award-winning Little Theatre of the Deaf.
