Both are graduates of Groves High School. Ms. Miller attended Denison University and will receive a degree in special education from Michigan State University in December.

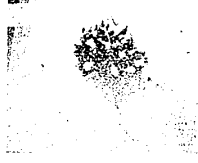
Siegel is a graduate of Kalamazoo College and is a first-year medical student at the University of Michigan.

Oak Park couple will be honorees

Jack and Pearl Kutnick of Oak Park will be honorees at a dinner of tribute on Sunday, Oct. 29 at Cong. Bnai Moshe in Oak Park.

The dinner is an annual event which the synagogue plans on behalf of State of Israel Bonds. The honorees will receive Israel's 30th Anniversary Award in recognition of their service to the synagogue, the community and to Israel.

Bernard Klein and Abe Pasternak are dinner co-chairpersons.

"As a 1978 priority project, Israel's leaders are determined to eliminate the slums now inhabited by 45,000 fam-

ilies—that is, some 300,000 people—and thereby eradicate a social problem intolerable to a democratic society," Pasternak said. "An outpouring of loan fund dollars are needed and we of Bnai Moshe want to do all we can to help."

Kutnick is the immediate past president of the synagogue and has been active for many years. Council for Arts announces grant

The Michigan Council for the Arts recently announced guidelines for three pilot grants programs.

Applications for grants to creative artists, touring events-in-residence and visual-artists-in-public-service may be considered for money in fiscal year 1979-80.

CREATIVE ARTISTS program makes available up to \$4,000 to visual artists, composers, choreographers, poets/fiction writers, film/video artists, to set aside time to work, buy supplies and materials and to achieve career goals.

The grants will also assist creative artists to begin new projects of complete works in progress. Deadline for application is Feb. 23, 1979, for activities taking place between Oct. 1, 1979, and Sept. 30, 1980.

TOURING-EVENTS-IN-RESIDENCE is designed to provide opportunities for communities to participate in, and sponsor, residencies by outstanding Michigan or national touring events and exhibitions.

The matching grant program makes available up to half the cost of a touring event. Grants of \$2,000-\$20,000 are available.

Deadline for application is April 6, 1979, for activities taking place Oct. 1, 1979-Sept. 30, 1980.

A comprehensive booklet, "Guide to Programs," outlining grants program guidelines, will be available from the council by Oct. 1.

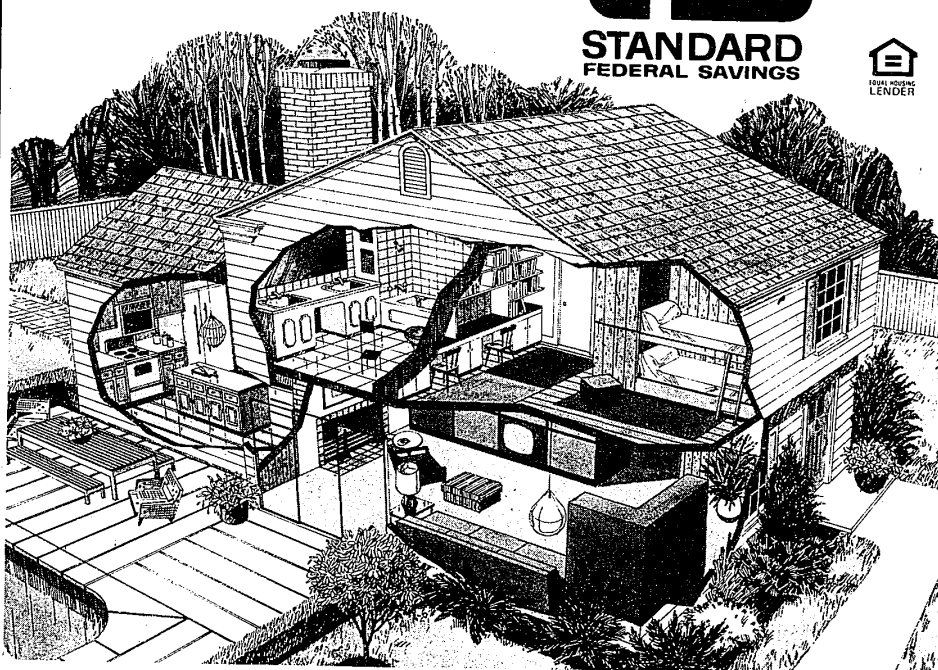
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
