

# N. Farmington to face test in Flint Northern

For North Farmington, the serious football starts next Saturday.

North Farmington, ranked No. 6 in one poll of Michigan Class A teams, has recorded three impressive victories this season, including a 40-0 rout of Redford Thurston Saturday in the Northwest Suburban League.

But, in what should be its toughest test so far, North hosts speedy Flint Northern Saturday at 2 p.m.

The game, a nonleague, could make or break coach Ron Holland's Raiders as far as a berth in the post-season football playoff is concerned.

North would certainly have to beat Northern—and that won't be easy—and win the rest of its games, too.

Northern has a 2-1 record, having beaten Pontiac Central, 24-19, Friday. Northern's only loss came against powerful Flint Southwestern. North's

defense will have to stop Northern quarterback Kermitt Pitts, an excellent passer, and running back David Hodges.

"Northern will probably be our biggest challenge speedwise," Holland said. "We'll have to have more of a containing defense this week. We can't let them get around us, and we can't let their quarterback beat us. He throws real well."

AGAINST THURSTON, North amassed 322 total yards, 189 coming on the ground. The Raiders put the game out of reach with a 24-point first quarter, and then completed the rout with a touchdown in each of the last three quarters.

"We just ran and passed at will, and Thurston never stopped us," Holland said. "It was sort of over by halftime."

Senior tailback Jeff Cohen, who

rushed for 101 yards in 11 carries, scored on a short run, and end Ron Nutter caught two touchdown passes from junior quarterback Greg Goldstein.

Goldstein, who started the season as the team's third-string quarterback, passed to Tom Herrington for a six-yard touchdown, and scored another

attempted. Paul George kicked the points after the final two touchdowns.

Perhaps the most pleasant surprise for Holland this season has been the play of Goldstein at quarterback. Called into service after North's best two quarterbacks were injured in a preseason scrimmage, Goldstein has been doing "a tremendous job," said Holland.

Against Thurston, he went six for seven in the passing department and accounted for most of North's 133 yards passing. Even if the other two quarterbacks get healthy, they'll have to earn their way back into the lineup.

"You always stay with a winner," Holland said. "Those other kids are going to have to show that they deserve to be in there in practice."

North's defense, led by nose guard Dan Gasser and linebackers Pat Collins and Tim Deighton, held Thurston

to 35 yards on the ground and 41 through the air.

Thurston fell to 2-1 with the loss.

## HHS triumphs

Farmington Harrison's football team presented coach John Herrington with his 50th coaching victory last Saturday with a 24-0 showing over Waterford Mott in the Western Six League opener.

Harrison, which won its season opener over Farmington High before losing big (20-0) against Birmingham Groves, finally produced some offense against Mott with 241 yards rushing.

Harrison tailback Dave Turnquist, a 200-pound senior, rushed for 83 yards and scored one touchdown on a nine-yard run. Greg Moore grabbed a nine-yard scoring pass from quarterback Drew Norton, and Jim Miller added another TD on a five-yard scamper.

Peter Lundburg, who made good on all three point-after kicks, kicked a field goal from 20 yards out.

Herrington, who has coached Harrison since the school opened in 1969, was pleased with his team's offensive efforts against Mott.

"We're starting to move a little on offense now," he said. "We don't have great speed, but our offensive line is starting to open up some holes, and this Turnquist is starting to run well for us."

As usual, Harrison's defense turned in a fine job against Mott. Nose guard Ted Timmis was credited with eight tackles and recovered a Mott fumble. Linebacker Kurt Stearns had eight tackles, and monster man John Brancheau had an intercepted pass to go with his six tackles.

"We've played three good defensive games so far," Herrington said. "Even in our 20-0 loss to Groves, we played good defense."

Harrison hits the road for a WSL game against Walled Lake Western on Friday (Sept. 29). The game begins at 8 p.m. on Walled Lake Central's field.

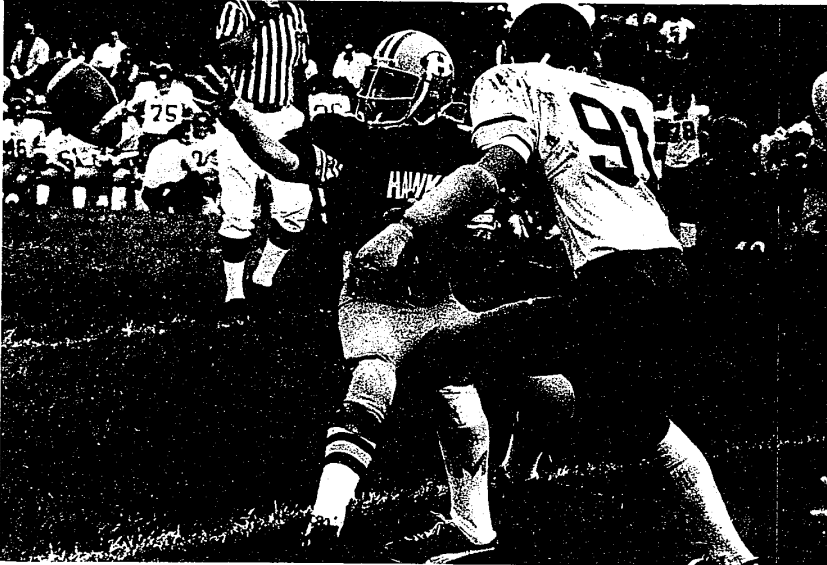
Western has a 1-2 record under new coach Chuck App, who came over from Northville High. Last Friday, Livonia Churchill, which should be the team to beat in the Western Six this fall, blasted Western, 41-6.

Despite Western's one-sided loss last Friday, Herrington is still concerned about its speedy backs in Kurt Drheim and John Meyer. "Western has good outside speed, so we'll have to work on stopping that this week."

# Falcons meet goals

Farmington High, a loser in its first two football outings this season, won its Inter Lakes League opener in convincing fashion last Saturday with a 15-0 victory over Milford Lakeland.

"Our kids set some goals last week and they did a very nice job of meeting them," said Farmington coach Hal Beardsley, whose Falcons entertain Pontiac Northern in an ILL game on Saturday (Sept. 30).

"They wanted to get 200 yards on the ground against Lakeland, and they did," Beardsley said. "And they wanted to shut out that team and hold it to under 100 yards on the ground. They did that, too."

Farmington running back Chuck Cisko, who gained 114 yards in 16 carries against Lakeland, ran four yards for a second-quarter touchdown, and then kicked the extra point after teammate Doug Ely ran two yards for a TD in the third quarter.

Farmington picked up two points on a safety in the second quarter. Lakeland QB Clay Miller was sacked in his endzone by Bob Crawford and Scott Hazen. Crawford, a 170-pound senior end, played a strong defensive game, recording six quarterback sacks.

Lakeland managed only 47 yards rushing and 85 more through the air.

Farmington, with Cisko and Dan Kaminski leading the way, rushed for 206 yards. Junior QB David

Schultz completed five passes for 45 yards.

PONTIAC NORTHERN, next Saturday's opponent, won't be a pushover, despite its 1-2 record, Beardsley said. Last Friday, Northern lost to Livonia Stevenson, 27-13.

"I've seen Northern twice, and they're tough," Beardsley said. "They have lots of speed. This kid Ernest Allen is very fast, and this end, Milton Carthens, caught two touchdown passes against Stevenson."

The Northern-Farmington game begins at 2 p.m. Saturday. Farmington High is located at 32000 Shivassee.
