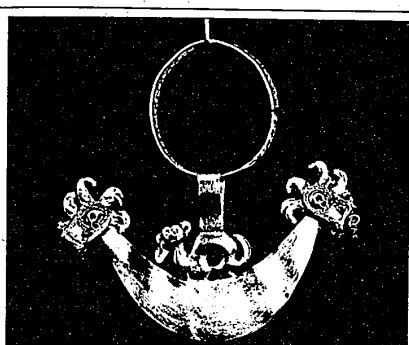

When the Detroit Institute of Arts brings "Peru's Golden Treasures" here next month, The Community House in Birmingham will be taking interested persons to view the significant collection.

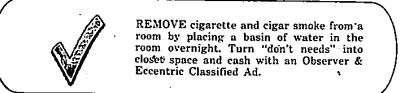
Part of the Community House outreach programming, the planned afternoon is scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 17.

The package includes luncheon at

the Detroit Institute of Arts, tickets to the show, use of By-Word Audio Guide which is a flexible four commentary which allows the individual to enjoy the exhibition at his own pace, and round-trip transportation from The Community House. Space is limited for the event and reservations are being accepted now at The Community House, Bates and Townsend, 64-5832.

"Peru's Golden Treasures," the largest collection of Pre-Columbian goldwork ever shown in The United States, brings more than 225 artifacts to the art institute and includes such items as golden mummy masks, burial gloves, ceremonial knives, necklaces, ear spools, beakers, tweezers, sculpted human and animal figures, and much more.

This extraordinary loan from the Museo Oro del Peru in Lima is the only evidence of little-known civilizations which flourished during 2,000 years before the Spanish conquest of 1532. No native written records exist of the Inca (1300-1532 A.D.), Chimu (800-1470 A.D.), Moche (100 B.C. to 700 A.D.), Nazca (200 B.C. to 700 A.D.), and Vicus (200 B.C. to 400 A.D.).

SEALED BIDS for the purchase of the above-described bonds will be received by the undersigned at the Central Office Building, located at 32500 Sawdust, Farmington, Michigan, 48024, on Tuesday, the 17th day of October, 1978, until 3:00 o'clock P.M. Michigan Time, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read. Sealed bids will also be received, in the alternative, on the same date and until the same time by an agent of the undersigned at the office of the Municipal Advisory Council of Michigan, 2135 First National Building, Detroit, Michigan, 48226, where they will simultaneously be publicly opened and read. Bidders may choose either location to present bids and good faith checks as above provided, but not both locations. The bonds will be awarded to the successful bidder at a meeting of the Board of Education to be held at 8:00 o'clock P.M. on the above date.

BOND DETAILS: The bonds will be coupon bonds of the denomination of \$5,000 each, dated September 1, 1978, numbered in direct order of maturity from 1 upwards, will bear interest from their date payable on May 1, 1979, and semi-annually thereafter, and will mature (without option of prior redemption) on May 1 in years and principal amounts as follows:

INTEREST RATE AND BIDDING DETAILS: The bonds shall bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding 6 1/2% per annum, to be fixed by the bids therefor, expressed in multiples of 1/8 or 1/20 of 1%, or both. The interest on any one bond shall be at one rate only, all bonds maturing in any one year must carry the same interest rate and each coupon period shall be represented by one interest coupon. The difference between the highest and lowest interest rates on the bonds shall not exceed two percentage points. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than 100% of their par value will be considered.

PURPOSE AND SECURITY: The bonds are to be issued for the purpose of defraying the cost of making improvements to school buildings and sites, including parking lots, playgrounds, athletic fields and other school facilities, and purchasing school equipment and furnishings. The full faith and credit of the school district will be pledged for payment of the bonds and the interest thereon and the school district is authorized and required to levy, without limitation as to rate or amount, such ad valorem taxes as may be necessary for that purpose.

PAYING AGENT: Both principal and interest shall be payable at a bank or trust company located in Michigan qualified to act as paying agent under State or United States law, to be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds, who may also designate a co-paying agent, which bank or trust company, qualified to act as paying agent under the law of the State in which located or of the United States, both of which shall be subject to approval of the undersigned.

GOOD FAITH: A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$40,000 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the school district must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bids be accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of the successful bidder will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail. The good faith check of the successful bidder will be immediately cashed and payment for the balance of the purchase price of the bonds shall be made at the closing.

AWARD OF BONDS: The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid produces the lowest interest cost computed by determining at the rate or rates specified in the bid, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from November 1, 1978, to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium.

STATE QUALIFICATION: The bonds have been fully qualified pursuant to Act 108, Public Acts of Michigan, 1961, as amended, enacted pursuant to Section 16, Article IV, of the Michigan Constitution of 1963. Under the terms of said constitutional and statutory provisions, if for any reason the school district will be or is unable to pay the principal and interest on the bonds when due, then the school district must borrow and the State must lend to it an amount sufficient to enable the school district to make the payment.

LEGAL OPINION: Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified approving opinion of Dickinson, Wright, McKean, Cutlip & Moon, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan, a copy of which opinion will be printed on the reverse side of each bond, and the original of which will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds at the delivery thereof.

DELIVERY OF BONDS: The school district will furnish bonds ready for execution at its expense. Bonds shall be delivered without expense to the purchaser at Detroit, Michigan. The usual closing documents, including a certificate that no litigation is pending affecting the issuance of the bonds, will be delivered at the time of the delivery of the bonds. If the bonds are delivered by twelve o'clock noon, Michigan Time, on the 40th day following the date of sale, or the first business day thereafter if said 40th day is not a business day, the successful bidder may on that day, or any time thereafter until delivery of the bonds, withdraw his proposal by serving notice of cancellation in writing, on the undersigned, in which event the school district shall promptly return the good faith deposit. Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve Funds. Accrued interest to the date of delivery of the bonds shall be paid by the purchaser.

## ORCHARD LAKE ROAD LOCATION AND DESIGN STUDY REPORT

APPROVED BY:  
The Federal Highway Administration

The Oakland County Road Commission has been notified of approval by the Federal Highway Administration and the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation of the Location and Design Study for Orchard Lake Road in the City of Farmington Hills and West Bloomfield Township.

Notice of approval and intent to construct is hereby given as required by Federal Aid Highway Program Manual 7-7.5. Notification of approval was dated September 12, 1978, and signals the Road Commission to proceed with right-of-way acquisition and final design plans. The portion approved for widening is from north of Twelve Mile Road to Will-O-Way Street, a distance of 4.2 miles. The anticipated 1979 construction project extends from north of Twelve Mile Road to Maple Road, a distance of 2.8 miles. The project will be funded jointly by the Michigan Department of Transportation, the Oakland County Road Commission, City of Farmington Hills and West Bloomfield Township.

The approved Location and Design Study and the Final Negative Declaration on environmental impacts are available for public inspection and copying at the Oakland County Road Commission Offices, 31001 Lahser Road, Beverly Hills, Michigan. Office hours are between 8:00 a.m. and 4:45 p.m.
