THE ACTING COMPANY will present Shakespeare's immortal love story, "Romeo and Juliet," Oct. 29, "Romeo and Juliet," one of Shake-

speare's earliest plays, is a tender love story set against the violent back-

ground of the quarreling houses of Montague and Capulet, whose antago-nisms are resolved only with the deaths of a son and daughter.

Jean Anouilh's "Antigone" will be presented Oct. 30 and 31. Written in 1944, "Antigone" is a modern-dress version of the Greek classic by Sophocles.

The play focuses on the conflict between man's law and political expediency on one side and moral law and human dignity on the other. It emphasizes the tragic view of life that requires a price for everything received in this world.

Its parallels to modern times are as easily grasped as they were when the

play was first performed in France during the German occupation.

INSTEAD OF imposing a sentence on the youth, a magistrate puts him under the care of a psychiatrist. The cuming youth strikes a bargain with his interrogator; he will answer one question for each of his own that the


psychiatrist will answer, thus selting the stage for a powerful verbal duel that reveals the turmoil in the psychiatrist's own life.
