Walled Lake falls short on student count estimate

Walled Lake School District's Fourth Friday count shows that enroll-ment figures fell significantly short of the number of students which had been expected in the preparation of the 1978-79 school budget. Asst. Supt. for Business Harry Car-lson had projected an enrollment of some 11,300 students during budget preparation.

Under the during budge But as preliminary encollment counts were conducted throughout the district, it became more and more apparent that the enrollment would not meet the projected figures. When the final figures were tabu-lated Sept. 29, they revealed a total of 11,153 Students for both the regular K-2 and adult education programs—147 students short of the projected number.

The "fourth Friday" count is impor-tant because it is used to determine just how much money the local district will receive in state school aid

Since the Walled Lake Schools receive a total of 1,569 per student in state aid and local property taxes, the loss of 147 students figures out to a loss of approximately \$20,000. The Walled Lake school board has adopted a 137-79 badget in which proj-ected expenditures of \$19,7 million

exceed projected revenues of some \$19.32 million by approximately \$377,000.
