ELF still spells doomsday

It has been a shell game now for over five years. Now you see it, now you don't. Every time it has been proposed for Michigan, it has come with a new name.

By any name it is a weapons system which would cover a great area of the Upper Peninsula with wires to transmit a one way "doomsday" message to submarines deep in the ocean. The only message it would be used for would be to launch the final retaliatory attack upon the Soviet Union.

The new weapon system's name is "ELF". It used to be "Seafarer" and then "Sanguine." Whatever its name, this gigantic weapons system has been rejected by local county votes, by the people who live in the area in which it would be installed. It has been rejected by Gov. William Milliken.

Now THE NAVY has told the people of Michigan that since it is a new name and a different system they

will no longer allow the people of Michigan or the governor to have anything to say about it.

The decision is now in the hands of President Jimmy Carter. Having been a part of the submarine service himself we wonder if the decision is in the right place.

The original area which the Navy sought was 4,000 square miles to lay this cable across the Upper Peninsula. Now they claim to want only 130 miles in a giant X formation. It is now claimed to be smaller, but it is the same immoral system.

The system of buried cables would constantly emit low frequency radio waves. It would be used in place of normal means of communication to reach nuclear weapons and submarines. By this point in a war the other means of communication would be destroyed and the remaining submarines would be hiding deep in the ocean.

Is it not a greater outrage to everyone upon our earth? Is it not a sign of the extent to which men will hate and distrust their fellow men? Is there not a point beyond which a deterrence becomes a total disregard for the future of the earth?

It is my hope and belief that Seafarer by any other name shall not be planted in Michigan or any other state.

Wayne Klein Communications of Bloomfield Hills is strongly involved in political campaigns, as well as small manufacturing, food and other consumer-oriented products. Klein, a graduate of the University of Detroit, worked for United Press International, the Detroit News, and as a war correspondent during the Korean War. He was also a director of Young and Rubicam Advertising for nine years and a communication director for Lenore Romney.

Nieman was a Grand Rapids Press reporter covering state and local government and western Michigan correspondent for the New York Times prior to becoming Oakland County Information Officer. A graduate of the University of Detroit, Nieman has also served as press representative for Detroit Edison.

Sedalio had six years' experience with WXYZ prior to joining Channel 2 in 1976 as program coordinator. He possesses his degree in mass communications from Wayne State University.

The seminar, covering all aspects of public relations management, will be a Friday evening session, from 6:00 a.m. as well as a full day on Saturday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., including the panel discussion with the four experts,

and a question and answer period.

The session is the first of a three-part course which will also offer the Principles of Professional Salesmanship on the weekend of Nov. 10-11, and the Principles of Advertising on Dec. 8-9.

The seminar is open to anyone for credit or noncredit, and may be taken by itself, or with the other two seminars in the series. The fee for the course for credit is tuition plus \$5 per weekend. Each weekend session is available for one credit, at \$42 per credit.
