George Shearing set as luncheon feature

A luncheon with George Shearing has been scheduled for 11:30 a.m. on Monday, Nov. 6 at the Raleigh House in Southfield. The event will benefit the Academy of the Sacred Heart in Bloomfield Hills.

Mrs. A. John Helganz is general chairman of this 22nd annual event which includes a social hour at 11:30 a.m. and luncheon at 12:30 p.m. followed by entertainment by Shearing. The luncheon is open to the public.

The academy is an independent college preparatory day school for girls in pre-kindergarten through grade 12. The school also enrolls boys in pre-kindergarten through grade one. Located at 1280 Kensington Road in Bloomfield Hills, the school currently has 442 students.

Operated by the Religious of the Sacred Heart, the academy educates students of all faiths and socioeconomic backgrounds from the entire metropolitan Detroit area.

Financial aid, based on academic acceptance and need is available on request. The annual fall celebrity luncheon enables Sacred Heart to continue this assistance.

George Shearing can be described as a "tatters to tails" success story. He overcame many handicaps, from being born congenitally blind into a family of nine children in London, England to become internationally known for his fabulous keyboard technique.

His only formal musical education consists of four years of study at the London Lodge School for the blind. In the 1930s he made his first radio appearance and while still in his twenties, he landed a recording contract and came to dominate British jazz polls.

In 1947, he moved to America and was a success in this country as well. His reputation was set when he was booked into New York's Birdland and penned his famous "Lullaby of Birdland" in 1952.

He builds his improvisations mostly on ballads, embroidering them beautifully with harmonic alterations, unusual octave passages and intricate, right hand runs.

Shearing has a feathery touch and shows a flair for bebop rhythms, locked-hand harmonies and an ability to transcribe his classical background to jazz.

He has played more than 300 concerts in the past four years and last year covered 20 cities in a European tour. He has accumulated awards from every trade and jazz poll and has many successful recordings.

While in Michigan Mrs. Reichardt

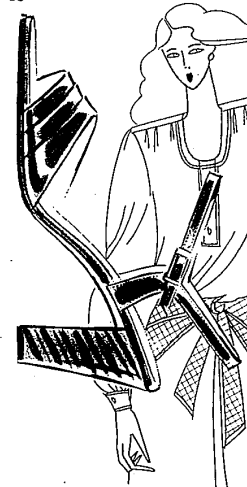
