

500 netters play on MATT teams

The Michigan Association of Team Tennis has finished its first two weeks of league play. All the teams are finally playing in the proper places, in the proper attire, with tennis balls and tennis rackets.

There are 40 teams competing in six divisions. A total of 500 people are playing in the fall leagues.

Tom Mahaffey's Rockwell Gasers is tied with Guy Rondot's Hackers for first place in the Men's A division with 9½ points. Gary Allen's team is third with 7½ points. Andy Maunders' Creamers and Hal Lyon's Lucky Devils each have four points. Henry Womersley's squad is last with three points.

Does watching TV harm your eyes? For as much as six or eight hours a day, in the early days of TV, complaints of eyestrain were found to be caused by the small screen and the tendency of the viewer to sit too close to the set.

Actually, there is no reason why TV viewing should injure the eyes if a few simple rules are followed. Wear your regular glasses for distance viewing. Sit at least 8 to 10 feet from the picture. Have the room lighted with a soft indirect light from lamps which do not reflect on the tube. Blink your eyes frequently. Look away, blink and change focus to rest your eyes. And, be sure your set is properly adjusted. If your eyes give you discomfort, have them examined to determine and correct the difficulty.
