The issue: Should the Michigan Constitution be amended to prohibit the use of property taxes for school operating purposes, and to establish a voucher system for financing education of students at public and nonpublic schools?

The local property tax currently provides a major source of revenue to operate public schools in Michigan. It is collected by local governments and supplemented by state school aid according to law.
The state constitution probabilist the allocation of state funds to nonpublic elementary and secondary schools although it does allow the legislature to provide for transported income.

although it does allow the legislature to provide for transportation of students to and from any school. Proponents wish to make public funds available to finence nonpublic schools while some opponents are opposed to funding nonpublic schools. The property tax is considered inequitable by many, but no agreement has yet been reached on a different method of funding schools. Many fear the loss of local control over schools, and the fact that there are no provi-

sions for busing students to the schools of their choices.

The tuttion voucher proposal would make major changes in financing education in Michigan. It would profibit the use of property taxes for school operating expenses, including intermediate school districts, and vocational and special education.

It would also require the legislature to establish a program of general state toxation for support of schools, and to provide for the issuance of an educational voucher to be applied toward financing a students's education at a public or nonpublic school of his parent's or guardian's choice.


