

Glenn rips Stevenson, 28-0

It was obvious by the end of the first half Friday that Westland John Glenn had taken the steam out of Livonia Stevenson's engines and was on the verge of an important non-league football victory.

The Spartans tallied just 12 yards rushing in the first half and 30 through the air. Glenn, on the other hand, scored three touchdowns and then added one more in the second half to win the gridiron clash, 28-0.

Stevenson, which had been so potent offensively in the last few weeks, fell apart in the early going and failed to put together a scoring drive. The Spartans' record fell to 7-1.

The Rockets, however, exploded time and time again. After falling to North Farmington two weeks ago, Glenn seemed none the worse.

"Defensively, we had a shutout going and any time you can shut out Stevenson, which is so explosive, you have to be proud and happy," said

Glenn coach Chuck Gordon. "I was very happy with the way the kids played."

"They just overwhelmed us in every department. They moved the ball well against us, they ran well and played strong defense. We couldn't move the ball at all," said Stevenson mentor Jack Reardon.

Following a bad punt by Tom Smith, the Rockets took possession of the football deep in the Spartan end of the field, the 29 yard line, and went on to score.

Glenn plunged forward and worked his way to the five yard line where tailback Tim Ruark blasted his way into the endzone on an off-tackle play for the touchdown. The extra point kick by Kal DeLucca was perfect.

Early in the second period, following another punt, Glenn marched down the field and scored. Kurt Hagemann set up the touchdown with a 36-yard counter run which put the ball at the Stevenson 25.

Ruark again scored for Glenn, this

time, literally diving three yards into the endzone. The off-tackle play came with 9:04 remaining in the second quarter. The point-after kick was good.

Still in the second period, Glenn took possession of the ball at its own 15 yard line and quickly moved to the 30. Quarterback Rob Suida completed his first pass of the game to Hagemann covering 24 yards which put the ball at the Stevenson 35 yard line.

Brad Jennings caught a Suida pass three plays later for the third Rocket touchdown. With the ball at the 24, Suida went back and hit Jennings on a flag pattern. The extra-point kick was good, making the score 21-0 at the intermission.

One more touchdown went up on the scoreboard for Glenn midway in the third quarter. Glenn started a drive at its own 15-yard marker and quickly moved the ball to midfield.

Suida again connected on a pass, this time to Ed Hamel, for the touch- down. Hamel made an over-the-shoul-

der catch, outran a Stevenson defender and strolled into the endzone. The play covered 50 yards. The point- after was again good and Glenn had stunned the Spartans, 28-0.

Ruark charged the Rockets' rushing attack with 108 yards in 16 carries. Hagemann added 78 yards in eight carries, while Scott Thornton had 51 yards in eight attempts.

Jim Gemuend and Smith, the Spartans' leading backs, were barely able to pick up 45 yards between them.

Stevenson quarterback Jim Fox completed eight of 15 passes for approximately 65 yards.

"I was very disappointed with the game. I thought we should have put some points on the scoreboard," Reardon said.

"I think the fact that we moved the ball so well and controlled the game defensively—these were the keys," Gordon said.

The Rockets upped their record to 7-1 with the victory.

Inkster is victim, 34-6

Clarenceville gridders triumph

Two touchdowns by the potent Clarenceville passing duo of Jim Beyer to Mitch Borst led the Trojans to a rather easy 34-6 victory Friday over the Inkster Vikings in a non-league contest.

Aside from passing for two touchdowns and running for two more Beyer set a school record defensively with 17 unassisted tackles during the night.

The Trojans took advantage of an early Inkster mistake when nose-guard Tony Soave recovered a Viking fumble at Inkster's 26-yard line.

Beyer rolled into the endzone for the final seven yards to cap the scoring drive which took only four plays. The try for two was no good and after only

two minutes of the first half had elapsed, Clarenceville was off to a 6-0 lead.

Clarenceville's Russ Ivanac returned an Inkster punt 34 yards shortly after to set up another scoring drive, but the Vikings defense stiffened on a fourth and five from the 16 when Jim Thompson was stopped cold at the line of scrimmage.

Clarenceville controlled Inkster defensively most of the night behind the strong play of tackle Dan MacDonald and safeties Borst and Ivanac, as well as the great individual efforts of Beyer.

The Trojans drove deep into Inkster territory midway through the second quarter after Clarenceville's Borst went 21 yards on a reverse to set up a

first and goal inside the Viking 10-yard line.

But Inkster's Clifton Murphy intercepted a screen pass near the goal line, ending the threat.

Then, Inkster's offense finally got untraced as tailback Krafus Walker dashed the crowd with a 70-yard touchdown romp only to be called back on a clipping penalty.

Despite the call, the Vikings drove 70 yards to knot the score on Derrick Stevenson's three-yard plunge. The try for two was unsuccessful, and with only 58 seconds left in the half the score stood at 6-6.

Clarenceville struck right back after the ensuing kickoff when Beyer hit Borst for a 40-yard pass completion, moving the ball to the Inkster 30-yard line.

One play later, it was Beyer hitting Borst again, this time for 30 yards and a touchdown with only 16 seconds remaining in the half. Beyer successfully went to Borst again on the try for two and Clarenceville again had the lead, 14-6, as the half ended.

The Beyer-to-Borst combination wasted little time hooking up again when the second half opened, this time good for 32 yards and Borst's second touchdown of the night.

The try for two failed and the Trojans were in command, 20-6, with only two minutes gone in the second half.

Midway through the final quarter, Ivanac intercepted his second pass of the night and returned it 35 yards to the Inkster 25-yard line.

A 21-yard sweep by Chris Jeffrey set up a one-yard plunge by Beyer for the score, his second of the night.

Ivanac gathered in Beyer's pass on the try for two and, leading 28-6, Clarenceville had effectively put the game out of reach.

Robert Soop's one-yard dive late in the game capped the scoring and gave the Trojans their fifth win against only three defeats.

Clarenceville head coach Ralph Weddle was full of praise for his squad following the win.

"The defense shut down their speed and our offense did the rest," said Weddle, also pleased with the play of young Borst.

"He's one tremendous receiver—great hands and he runs patterns extremely well."

Beyer completed 13 of 19 passes for 230 yards.

Clarenceville hosts Inkster Cherry Hill Friday. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

The City of Farmington Hills Planning Commission will give formal consideration to a Proposed Amendment (Rezoning Request No. 30-9-78) which would rezone part of the Northwest 1/4 of Section 12, City of Farmington Hills, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, being more particularly described as: The Southerly portion of Lot 141 of Supervisor's Plat of Woodcock Farms No. 1 in Section 12, T.1N., R.9E., more particularly described as beginning at the most Southerly corner of said Lot 141, thence N23°53'W 387.91 ft., thence North-easterly on a curve to the left whose long chord bears N39°33'06"W 36.27 ft., with a central angle of 53°54'35" with a radius of 40.00 ft., and an arc distance of 57.6 ft.; thence S22°20'W 407.19 ft.; thence S57°14'00"E 50.00 ft.; thence S44°09'00"W 170.05 ft. to the point of beginning and containing 1,028 acres of land be the same more or less and the Southerly portion of Lot 142 of said "Supervisor's Plat of Woodcock Farms No. 1" in Section 12, T.1N., R.9E., more particularly described as beginning at the most easterly corner of said Lot 142, thence S46°08'00"W 387.75 ft.; thence N22°27'11"W 512.66 ft.; thence S87°06'00"E 68.10 ft.; thence S89°08'00"E 55.75 ft. with a central angle of 82°07'57" with a radius of 40.00 ft., and an arc distance of 61.68 ft.; thence S23°35'35"E 387.91 ft., to the point of beginning and containing 2.254 acres of land be the same more or less, all of "Supervisor's Plat of Woodcock Farms No. 1" a subdivision part of Section 12, T.1N., R.9E., Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, according to the plat thereof as recorded in L.55 P.23, of Plats, Oakland County, Michigan Records.
