Their science teacher, Sister Patricia Hewitt, took the helm in a six week study on Galileo's and Newton's principles of gravity, motion and inertia.

She also helped them to follow through by taking them on a trip to the Michigan Space Center in Jackson. There they viewed the displays including rockets, satellites, space suits, space movies and even bits of moon rock.

The field trip was meaningful for the group whose studies of scientific greats such as Newton and Galileo helped them grasp some of the principles which have made space flights possible.

"With these principles they are able
