

Playoff-bound Churchill rips Stevenson

On to the Class A state football playoffs!
Livonia Churchill, a small-sized, senior-dominated aggregation, pulverized Livonia Stevenson 32-0, Friday to earn its ninth consecutive victory of the season and one of eight berths in the playoffs.

The Chargers will play a quarterfinal game either Friday or Saturday at Berkley High School.

Churchill ground out long touchdown drives during its first three possessions to demonstrate to the highly-partisan home crowd in the packed stands that it was not to be denied.

Rick Coppola, a senior quarterback, engineered successive drives of 74, 85 and 91 yards and carried the ball a good chunk of that yardage himself.

Stevenson, which also had an outside chance for a playoff berth if it could have produced a victory, keyed its defense on Doran Mason, the Chargers' hard-running tailback.

With Mason well-covered, Coppola kept the ball around the ends and sometimes inside for gains up to 22, 22, 26 and 15 yards. He finished with 111 yards on 15 rushes.

Churchill took the opening kickoff and drove 74 yards in nine plays. Coppola capped the series with a three-yard touchdown burst around right end. He then kicked the extra point.

After a Stevenson punt, the Chargers took over at their 15 yard line and proceeded to cover 85 yards in 10 plays.

Mason took a pitch from Coppola and scrambled nine yards around left end for the score. The try for two points, with just under two minutes remaining in the first quarter, failed.

Churchill used a fake field goal to score its third touchdown with a 51-yard march in the second quarter.

On a fourth-down play at the Spartans' seven, Coppola, lined up as the placekicker, took a direct center snap, rolled right, then threw a pass to Austin Ryan, who made a diving catch in the endzone.

The extra-point kick was low.

Thurston dominates RU

For the first time in three years, Redford Thurston has produced a winning football season.

The Eagles did it by pounding Redford Union Friday, 29-7, in a non-league gridiron game.

Thurston finished the year with a 5-4 record, while RU slipped to a 2-7 mark. It was also the first time that the Eagles have won the intra-city contest since 1975.

Thurston exploded offensively throughout the game, ripping the RU defense to little pieces.

Between the running of Craig Schauder, Rich Rudi, and Jeff Wandig, the Eagles were just plain unstoppable.

Midway in the first quarter, the Eagles opened the scoring. RU took a punt from Thurston and drove to its 45-yard line. Two plays later, however, Joe Lyskawa stepped in front of a Jim Sopha pass and ran the ball to the 15-yard line.

Schauder then moved the ball to the 10-yard line and two plays later slammed his way into the endzone for the touchdown. The extra point attempt by John Klopec missed.

Early in the second period Jim Boyer recovered an RU fumble on the Eagles' 36-yard line. Mike Fitzsimmons then threw a 20-yard pass to Shawn Salisbury. From the 46-yard line, the Eagles drove toward the RU endzone.

At the nine-yard line, Rich Rudi took a pitch out and scrambled into the endzone untouched. Klopec's point-after effort was successful and Thurston was in front, 13-0.

The Panthers got on the scoreboard with 4:10 left in the second quarter. Thurston took the ball, following an RU punt and drove to the Panthers' 35 yard line.

One play later, Bob Uych recovered a Thurston fumble and ran 65 yards into the endzone.

The extra point kick was good.

On the ensuing kickoff, Thurston took over at its own 11-yard marker. On the first play from that point, Fitzsimmons tossed a pass to Salisbury who caught the ball at the 25 and ran out the defense into the endzone.

The Panthers' defense toughened and held Thurston at the five yard line. With two seconds left in the first half, Klopec came in and kicked a 25-yard field goal. The score at the intermission was 22-7.

After a scoreless third period, Thurston came out early in the fourth and put together one more touchdown drive. Following an RU punt, with Thurston taking the ball at its own 20, the Eagles marched to the Panthers' 25 yard line.

Fitzsimmons then hurled a pass to Gibson, who was brought down on the eight yard line. Two plays later, Schauder slashed into the endzone on a three-yard off-tackle play. The following extra point attempt was successful and that ended the scoring.

"I thought our quarterback played an outstanding game. I don't care what they say about (Rich) Hewlett. I think I have the finest quarterback in the state," said Thurston coach Don Riehl. "Fitzsimmons hit on some key passes that kept our drives going and had just a fine game."

"Well, I thought they (Thurston) came to play. I don't think we were ready to play," said RU coach Harvey Heltman. "They ran up the middle on us and nobody did that to us all year."

"Our defense also did an outstanding job. I think we should have had a shutout," Riehl said. Schauder picked up 124 yards on the ground to lead the Eagles' offensive attack. Rudi added 88 yards and Wandig had 51.

Fitzsimmons hit on six of 10 passes for 170 yards through the air. Sopha, on the other hand, completed just three of eight and had three intercepted.

Uych picked up 71 yards rushing for the Panthers in 12 carries, while Sopha added 43 yards.
