

# In The Pocket

For years, it has been claimed that the women's all-star leagues in metropolitan Detroit were the strongest in the entire country.

In national competition, they have never failed to make a great showing. For example, last year Cora Fiebig was barely nosed out for the title in the prestigious Queen's title sponsored by the Women's International Bowling Congress.

Jerry Ritter made the national honor roll with the first perfect game ever bowled in the women's state tournament.

To prove that these were not fluke honors, Jerry returned to the limelight last Wednesday night at Crown Lanes when she posted a 734 series in the Ladies Major League. It is one of the highest totals ruled this year in the women's ranks and will assure her of a place on the national honor roll. To get the big count, she linked games of 255, 241 and 232.

She had a lot of company in the scoring battle. Jean Eastman rolled a 638 and Joyce Pursell had a 673 and was the victim of a frown from Lady Luck

when the No. 2 pin stood on the final frame and left her with a 299.

**BOWLING WAS BACK** on schedule at Wonderland Lanes when Ed Aust-rect came through with a 706 series after the sharpshooters missed the 700 barrier a week ago. He opened with a 233, added a 258 and closed with a 215.

Not to be outdone by the men, Kathy Bencowski put on quite a show in the women's senior house league.

In her first game, she opened with a strike, then spared and ran a string of strikes to the last frame when a No. 10 pin failed to fall and held her to a 279. Following that, she added a 196 and then slumped to a 147 for a 622 series.

**THE GIRLS** also had a great time at Westland, where 200 games are becoming common.

This happened again when Mary Lee Snyder paced the Ladies Classic with games of 212 and 200 in 596. To gain the honor, she beat out Gndi Edwards, who fired a 226 in 582, and Dicki Tank, who fashioned a 591 with the aid of a 222 game.

## Jay cagers win

Leslie Fink scored 14 points and Pam Behrendt added 12 last Thursday as Southfield High ripped Birmingham Seaborn, 44-28, in a Southeastern Michigan Association girls' basketball game on the Maple's court.

Southfield, which has won nine of its last 11 games, has a 5-3 record in the SMA and a 9-6 overall mark.

"We're playing good ball right now," said Southfield coach Burt Hurshe. "Pam Behrendt can really play offense. Sheila McKaskill is rebounding well, and Fink can really shoot when she wants to."

A bad third quarter did in Seaborn, which scored only four points in the stanza to Southfield's 13. Cary McChes led the losers with eight points.

Several Southfield players—Karen Blumstein, Robin Brooks and Linda Watkins—required medical attention after the game due to the rough play. In another game last Thursday, Southfield-Lathrup got another good game from Sue Owens and defeated

Troy Athens, 49-28, in the Metro Suburban Association. Lathrup is 8-7 overall and 5-3 the MSA.

Owens, a 5-foot-7 senior guard, scored 17 points on seven field goals and three of seven from the line. Micky Thomas, a junior, added 13 points for Lathrup, which led by 10 points (29-19) at halftime.

Ann Garrett scored nine points for Troy Athens.

Earlier last week, Rochester Adams topped Lathrup, 47-43, in an MSA game. Owens hit a basket with seven seconds left in regulation time to force the OT, but Adams outpointed the Chargers, 8-4, with Jenny Shawyer and Rita Snow each scoring four points.

Owens scored 13 points for Lathrup, and Kathy Gordon had 15 for Adams, which led, 24-9, at halftime.

On Tuesday (Nov. 7), Southfield entertained Livonia Franklin, and Lathrup hosts Bloomfield Hills Laker. Both games begin at 7:30 p.m. In another Tuesday game, Southfield Christian hosts Oakland Christian at 7 p.m.

## 'S-L tankers triumph

Southfield High's Kris Albrant won two individual events last Thursday in her team's 135-46 loss to Berkley High in a Southeastern Michigan Association girls' swimming meet at Berkley. The loss put Southfield at 3-6 overall this season.

Albrant won the 200-yard individual medley (2:24.3) and the 500 freestyle (5:32.3).

Earlier last week, Albrant won two individual events and swam on a winning relay as Southfield defeated non-league Clawson High, 90-76. She took the 200 freestyle (2:06.7) and the 100 butterfly (1:08.5) before joining Monica Wywars, Colleen Jacobs, Mary Theresa Kilowick on the 400 free relay, which won in 4:24.4.

Southfield's Vicki Fine won the 500 free in 6:08.1, and teammate Michelle Schneider won the 100 breaststroke in 1:33.7.

Southfield swims next on Tuesday at home in a double dual against Redford

Bishop Borgess and Redford Thurston. The meet begins at 4 p.m.

### LATHRUP-ATHENS

Tracey Andrews and Sue Coykendall each won two events to pace Southfield-Lathrup's 116-56 win over Troy Athens in the Metro Suburban Association last Thursday. Lathrup is 8-2 overall and 3-0 in the MSA.

Andrews won the 200 IM (2:33.7) and the 100 freestyle (1:03.0), and Coykendall won the 100 breaststroke (1:15.8) and the 50 free (1:26.7). Lathrup's Lisa MacMillan won the 100 backstroke (1:06.4), Cindy Farrington won the 100 butterfly (1:10.1), and Lisa Hess won the 500 free (5:40.1).

Athens' Margaret Davison won the diving competition with 163.65 points.

Earlier, Lathrup stopped Birmingham Seaborn, 88-43, in a non-league meet. MacMillan won two events, the 100 fly (1:02.6) and the 50 free (1:25.8).

- To limit the state's taxing ability to the present ratio of total personal income of Michigan residents and to hold property tax increases to the rate of inflation.

## PROPOSAL E WILL PROVIDE NO TAX RELIEF! PROPOSAL H - THE VOUCHER PROPOSAL

### THE PROMISE:

- To end financing of public school operations with property taxes and to levy other taxes to finance a voucher system to be used by parents to pay for education at public and non-public schools.

### THE REALITY:

- Not bring a tax cut, but a tax shift. Most people, as a result, will pay higher taxes. Increased personal taxes, the Single Business Tax and other more burdensome taxes would have to make up the loss of property tax revenue.
- Taxpayers will now have to help support about 200,000 more pupils - those now in private or parochial schools - and that will raise taxes even more.
