Ski Prix aids Olympic team

More than 300 ski enthusiasts and supporters gathered at Alpine Valley ski lodge in Highland Saturday night for Ski Prix 78 to raise funds for the United States Ski Team.

Presented by the Michigan Ski Association, the dimer-dance benefit was highlighted by an evening long "write-in auction" where bioders had the choice of a vast array of items which included two-week stays in luxury comminiums in Honolulu and Vail, Col. and ski weekends at Northern Michigan resorts. Items ram the gamut from auto repairs to designer ski wear, to entertainment and restaurant gift certificates.

Stein Erickson, the Norwegian Olympic gold medalist and world champion skier, was host of the event along with Detroit's Channel 2 weath-erman Barry ZeVan.

Other celebrities were 1978 World Championship bronze medalist Pete Paterson and the Don Thomas's,

whose seventh season of contribution to Ski Prix was highlighted by the anniversary celebration of their Sporthaus Ski Shops.

Michigan Ski Association President Sam Greenawalt said the benefit raised \$20,000. Two thirds of the money will go to the United States Ski Team, with the remainder going to the Michigan Ski Association for the train-ing of future champiorship hoepfuls.

Benefit chairman Kemeth C. Myers worked along with MSA committee member Peggy Gemmel. Others attending were Ski Prix originator Gloria Galstein of Orchard Lake, whose involvement with the benefit began six years ago, and who remains an active participant, along with Mr. and Mrs. David Ward, also of Orchard Lake. Ward is presently treasurer of the Michigan Ski Association.

Alpine Ski Lodge facilities were donated for the second season by owners Willis Stoick of Orchard Lake and Joe Kocis of Rochester.

The match schedule requires participants to be available during prescribed hours: Juniors—9 a.m. through noon; women—14 p.m.; singles—will be played Tuesdays and Wednesdays; Doubles—will be played Thursday and Friday; Men—5-11 p.m.

Trophies will be awarded to winners and rumers-up in each division. Default time of 15 minutes will be enforced.

All matches are two out of three sets with a nine-point tie-breaker at 6-all. A 10-minute warm-up will be allowed.

All matches will be played at the Franklin Recquet Club. Entry deadline is Dec. 18. Finals will be played 9 a.m. through 2 p.m. Friday, Dec. 30.

A finals party and trophy presentation will be held 3 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 30. Players and friends are invited. Advance reservation is required for a buffet dinner which will cost \$5 per person.

A luncheon fashion show of tennis fashions will be held during tournament week, 11 a.m. Thursday, Dec. 28.

Divisions in the tournament include adult, men and women, singles and doubles. Adult play is futher divided into ability divisions: Open or AA. 4.5 rating and over; A. 4.0 rating and over; B. 3.5 rating and over; C. 2.5 rating and under.

Junior play will be boys and girls singles. There will be three age divisions: 18 and under, 15 and under and 12 and under.
