Wickes Furniture in Livonia is the place to go to see 10 trees decorated by members of area organizations. Each group is eager to get your vote because the winning trees will easy. \$300, \$100 or \$75 for the organization itself or the charity of its choice.

The winning tree from the Livoria store will join the winners from Wickes stores in Riverview and War-ren in an auction at 3 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 3 in the Livoria store on Seven Mile, west of Middle Belt. Radio per-sonality Tom Dean will auction off the three trees with proceeds going to the club which decorated it.

The 27 trees remaining will be donated to children's homes, convalescent homes, pediatric sections of local hospitals or to the place requested by the organization decorating it.

When you pick a favorite, you may favor the homemade look of the tree festooned by the Livoria Branch of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association with its strings of popcorn, piacones, decorated milkweed pods and walmuts used as a tiny setting for an even smaller toy baby.

Or maybe you'll dig the tree deco-rated by the Redford Jaycee Aux-iliary. A large brilliant red bow sits on the top with its treamers falling down the side of the tree. Auxiliary mem-bers have used egg shells the way the Livonia gardeners used walmuts, as a background setting for wee flowers, in this case.

You'll have two choices of trees prepared by the Livoria Association for the Academically Talented. Those involved with programs for grades three through six raised a corn husk angel to the top of the tree and put a tiny golden hals on her head. There are strings of popcom, walmut shells holding red berries, thistles with red ribbons attached, and a collection of corn husk angels arranged among the branches.

RAGGEDY ANN GRACES the top of the tree decorated by those involved in the Frost Junior High School program for academically latented students in grades seven to nine. Cranberry and popoenn strands circle the tree. Farm men and women made of clothespins mingle among the pine needles, along with a colorful collection of handmade togs, druns, a car, a drum, stagecoach, airplane, car, bear, hobby horse, wagon bird and train engine.

Purple and gold bows, Lions Club colors, hold up numerous pairs of glasses and provide an appropriate theme for the tree assigned to the Livonia Lioness Club. The organization helps the bilind and recycles glasses.

The tree that best reflected the concept stressed by Wickes Furniture for the Christmas tree of love was trimmed by the Livonia Branch of the American Association of University Women. Red hearts were all over the place, dominating the view. They were augmented by gold bows.

The Women of St. Fabian Church of Farmington Hills went in heavily for pink and maroon bows, white felt doves, bouquets of dried flowers and sparking silver bells and snow flakes.

Divine Child School in Dearborn cre-ated a dramatic effect with a white dove floating on the top of their tree. Down through the foliage lung silver frames of nativity and other scenes.
