For many years, the Detroit Women's Bowling Association, with a membership of more than 130,000, has been a leader in charity donations and offering a helping hand to the unfortunate.

Now the women are involved in one of their greatest efforts. They are planning the purchase of a bus, valued at \$24,000, that will be used to transport maimed war veterans from their hospital and other parts of the area, to the weekly bowling sessions at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park.

Just recently, the women also visited the Michigan Cancer Foundation's Meyer L. Prentiss Center, and donated \$500 to help the cause.

KEN LAND picked an opportune time to win his first title in the Michigan Majors Bowling Association. He won the championship in the annual battle at Sunnyside Lanes last Sunday. He averaged 227 and won his final 10 games after losing the first two.

Fred McClain, one of the top pin-rollers in the all-star leagues, finished as the top money winner with \$2,430.

MIKE SAMARDZIC celebrated his return to the Stroh lineup after a year's absence by rolling a 695 series and now is well on his way again to stardom.

JOHN HURLEY, who has been on a scoring spree in the Monday league at Westland Bowl, is writing his name indelibly on the pages of local bowling history. This week, he rolled a 740 series on games of 225, 238 and 287. It was his sixth 700 series of the season.

He was not alone in breaking the 700 barrier as Hal Jolley accomplished it in the Little Caesar classic when he put together games of 202, 287 and 216 for a 705 series.

Paul Christensen was right behind him with a 696 that was made possible by a 257 opening game. On the ladies side, **Jean Eska** was tops with games of 213 and 200 for 399.

WHEN HURLEY rolled his big series he left his rivals far behind, as Bob Gots landed second place with 688. Don Shale placed third with 673 where he tied Dave Antal.

One of the most unusual series of the season was the work of **Jim Blake**. Bowling in the Monday League, he missed the first game, then rolled scores of 143 and 290 for a 144 average.

JIM JESSON will have reason to remember rising early last Sunday morning. Competing with the Sunday Sleepers at Westland, he scattered the pins for a 656 series that is high for the season in the league.

NEIL BECKMAN was back in the winners' circle in the mixed classic at Farmington Lanes.

He uncorked a 258 game for a 661 series and beat his closest rival, Ken Marsh, by 53 pins. Others who bet-

tered double-century figures were **Joe Driscoll** with 608 and **Mike Keher** with 601.

In the ladies classic, **Audrey Sirola** showed the way with a 214 in 622 and **Carol Socala** had a 226 in 596. In the high school league, **John Ponke** paced the boys with a 222 in 635 and **Linda Hamlin** was tops among the girls with a 226 in 556.

In the junior house league, **Lou Brugman** took the pace-making role with a 273 in 637.

BETTY MARKWARDT scored one of her biggest victories of the season when she won two games and the series in the Livonia Ladies classic. She took the second game with 179-36-215, the third with 187-36-223 and the series with 546-108-644. **Lois Merriam** won the other game with a 218-22-241.

DOUBLE-CENTURY figures were the order of the day at Garden Lanes where **Russ Kram** paced the County league with 613 to beat out **Al Fernandez** by 13 pins. **Steve Turzewski** showed the way in the St. John Bosco league with 610 and **John Gavin** had 600 to top the mixed league.

IT WAS LIKE a dream to **Judy Parvi**, a 143 average bowler, when she rolled a 660 series on games of 232, 212 and 216 at Fiesta Bowl. Along the way, she posted 23 strikes.

IN OTHER outstanding performances, **LJ Duguid** paced the Merri-Bowl doubles with 614, and **Mike Demec**, a 12-year-old boy, fired a 614 in the Father & Son league.

Brian Collins, 15-years-old, was tops in the Recreation league at Woodland with 626 for his two games and **Lou Parkas** closed with a 268 to top the Kings and Queens with a 692.

Jerry McKin was high in the hydraulic loop at Plaza Lanes with a 245 in 641; **Betty Sowa** showed the way to the St. Collette Ladies at Plymouth Bowl with a 537. **Joe Kaskowski** fired a 682 in the senior house league at Super Bowl and **Renee Keppen** had a 644 in the Strike and Spare loop.

PAUL KOENIG qualified for membership in the 700 club at Bel-Aire when he broke the barrier with a 711 on games of 248, 255 and 238 in the Old Couples League.

To help celebrate the holiday season, **Gayle Friskorn**, who carries a 140 average, went 55 pins over with a 235 game in a 515 series in the Early Birds league.

Sign up for net tourney

Electricity is in the air for the first-ever Holiday Tennis Classic, Dec. 28-30, co-sponsored by the Franklin Racquet Club and the Eccentric Newspapers, and benefiting the American Cancer Society.

"Some of the area's best tennis players will be involved," said tournament director **Rev Waggoner**.

"We expect over 200 entries for this tourney," she said.

One of the top circuit players from the east, **Mike Jones**, has already made his reservations for the tourney.

He will play doubles with his brother, **Fred Jones**.

"Many of the players from Franklin are already lining up partners for the doubles draw," Waggoner said. "Also a lot of our travel team players have shown interest."

The four-day tournament will be played at the Franklin Racquet Club which is the largest racquet sports facility in the world.

The club houses 20 indoor tennis courts, 20 racquetball courts and five outdoor clay courts.

Other features of the club include a

pro shop, restaurant, sauna, whirlpool and exercise room.

"We have everything you want in addition to the tourney," said Waggoner.

The Holiday Classic is believed to be the first tournament, combining both adult and junior level events, of its kind scheduled the Christmas holidays in southeastern Michigan.

"This is going to be the biggest tournament of the winter season," said Waggoner.

The National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute needs volunteers to determine whether lowering blood cholesterol levels will reduce the risk of heart attacks. The program, being conducted at three medical institutions including the University of Minnesota, is gathering information on atherosclerosis, the disease basically responsible for heart attacks, strokes and related fatal diseases that account for some one million deaths, or 53 per cent, of all deaths in the United States annually.
