Jewish Community Center holds invitational art show

Thirty-four artists, including sculptor Morris Brose and painter Richard Kozlow of Birmingham, will be represented in the first invitational art show of the Jewish Community Center of Metropolitan Detroit.

The show will be held at the center, 6500 W. Maple, West Bloomfield, opening at 2:30 p.m. Dec. 3 and continuing through Dec. 17.

The artists, all from the metropolitan area, will exhibit sculpture, paintings, prints, ceramics and calligraphy. Among them are Thelma Abel, Barbara Keiden, Clara Rogers and Arthur Schneider, all of Birmingham.

Among Able's works is "Polarities," an intriguing concept in bi-polar attractions. In watercolor and pastels, two paintings sharing a single frame reveal the artist's exploration of energy.

Keiden's bold watercolors capture the cool yet powerful beauties of the Nordic seas. In Schneider's small, polished bronze, the lovers embrace, less with passion than with delicate humor and charm.

Southfield artist Aviva Robinson's works will include those from her "Core" series. The infinite mysteries implied in her geometric shapes come from the artist's disciplined use of color. Israeli-born Hava Schaver, also from Southfield, has experimented with ephemeral art. "Spectrum VII" is a "canvas" of layered latex, flesh-like, puddled with blood red acrylic. The climate changes the textures of this unusual work, shrinking or stretching its skin.

Other artists in the show are Anita Baxter, Naomi Dworak, Hanna Stiebel, Bloomfield Hills; Irvin Hollander, Dearborn; Irving Berg, David Einstein, Barbara Greene, Craig Hoffheimer, Detroit; Dorothy Dunitz, Jay Lefkowitz, Reva Swayder, Franklin; Sophie Fordon, Shirley Kalus, Donald Mendelson, Linda Mendelson, Stuart Shulman, Oak Park; Marjorie Hechi, Paul Levi, Charlotte Zack, Paula K. S. Zaks, Stan Rosenhal, Huntington Woods; Linda Zalla, Marilyn Schechter, West Bloomfield; Lynn Anderson, Janice Charach, Royal Oak; and Ben Glicker, Southfield.

Dr. Joseph Gutmann, professor of art history at Wayne State University and adjunct curator at the Detroit Institute of Arts, will be the guest speaker on the opening day of the show. His talk at 8 p.m. will be on "Jewish Art: The Facts and the Fantasies."

Other features of the invitational show include a concert at 3:30 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 3. The Center Symphony Orchestra with conductor Julius Chajes will present works by Chajes, Bach and Boccherini.

On Sunday, Dec. 17 there will be two works presented by the New Young Dancers Guild. At 1:30 p.m. the junior company of the guild will perform "Joseph and His Technicolor Dream Coat."

At 3 p.m. the senior company will perform "The Story of Levi Strauss—the Man Who Invented Blue Jeans."

There will be an admission charge for the symphony program and the dance performances. There is no charge for Dr. Gutmann's talk.
