## Ice cream parlor goes fresh with old-fashioned delights

Marc Whitefield, a Southfield attorney, and Manny Glaziers, his friend from childhood, crisscrossed the country over the past two years

"We've eaten so much ice cream, it's incredible." Whitefield said, in preparation for opening their new West Bloomfield ice cream house, Scoops, 6708 Orchard Lake Road in the West Bloomfield Plaza shopping center.

Scoops is apparently no idle business venture for Whitefield, a Birmingham resident, and fellow atterneys Norman Lippiti and Lou Glaziers, Manny's brother.

They spent time and money researching successful ice cream par-lors from coast to coast, like one they beard about in Boston where long lines of ice cream connoisseurs were reported.

THEIR NEW enterprise is a synthesis of the best ideas they saw and is based on a concern for nourishing food.

They opted for a high quality ice cream made fresh, using natural ingredients wherever possible. "I don't call it natural, because we use sugar." Whitefield said, "and chocolate by its very nature is not natural."

A local dairy puts together the mix. seconding to manager Manny Glacker of the same properties of the same properties

to make a thick, heavy ice cream. Ice and rock salt combine to freeze the lagredents in a half-hour's time. It is a superior of the salt o

SCOOPS MIXES are the store's main feature. You pick out an ice cream, then designate any number of garnishes from assortments of raisins, chocolate chips, ground Reese's peant butter cups, coconut, almonds and pineapple, depending on your taste and pocketbook. Glaziers places a dollup of ice cream on a marble slab, adds the embelliaments and works them throughout the scoop, resulting in a softened ice cream uniformly studded with what—in another store—would have been toppings.

It takes a bit longer to be served. The ice cream costs a bit more. But Whitefield says: "Our generation is more aware of what we're putting in

will turn into "an experience" where people will gather to eat ice cream and to talk. Meanwhile, he has put in a line of fresh juices (pomegranate, banana, strawherry-coonut, etc.), healthy snacks and a print gallery as a hedge against the ice cream business' traditional whiter showdown.

"It's really fun to be in a business where people are happy to be here." says Whitelied, who sees his share of troubled clients in his law practice. "We intend to open more of these places. When I see a lid's nose pressed up against the glass case, it really makes me feel good about the whole thing." The store is open non to 9 p.m. Sunday through Timrsday and noon to 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday.







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
