Faust gets second term as state Senate leader



VILLAM FAUST

An unprecedented open caucus Thursday night re-elected State Sen. William Faust (D-Westland) to another year as the senate's majority leader.
Victories came in triplicate that night for Faust, whose district includes Garden City and Canton Township.

Earlier that day, the state senate had voted to approve one of the senate reform measures, which Faust had wanted for some time. That vote gave the senate majority leader the power to appoint committee members and chairmen. They formerly were appointed by a committee of nine.

In a compromise move, the senate agreed that the majority leader would listen to recommendations from a seven-member advisory committee.

The minority leader of the State Sen-ate also will submit recommendation for committee appointments. The senate majority leader, how-ever, will relain final decisionnaking power over who get the appointments. These assignments are expected to be reallocated in some cases.

Faust has long urged that the sen-ate's rules, some of which are more than 100 years old, be revised. Senate observers believe more changes are

possible this year, particularly in light of Faust's unanimous re-election as majority leader.
"It's not a question of whether the reforms will come, now it's just a question of when," said I'm Hughes, a member of the central staff for senate Democrats.
The second victory for Faust came with the caucus vote to open the election of new leaders to the public.
"Senate Democrats have shown their committment to open the legisla-

tive process by conducting caucus business in an open session available for public inspection," commented Faust, who supported the move Faust's re-election as majority leader, his third victory of the day, is likely to mean additional reforms. "I'm graditied by the expression of support for my leadership, and I look forward to working with my Democratic colleagues for continuing progressive reform of the Michigan Senate," said Faust.

Other senators elected to positions during the open caucus are: Gary Corbin of Clio as assistant majority leader, Jack Faxon of Detroit as president pro tem, Jackie Vaughn III of Detroit as assistant president pro tem, David Plawecki of Dearborn Heights as majority floor leader and Michael Osteroit as assistant majority floor leader and Michael Osteroit as assistant majority floor leaders.

in noor reaser. Senator-elect John Kelly of Detroit was elected as majority whip. Others elected are John Hertel of Detroit, assistant majority whip; Carey Kammer of Pontiac, caucus chairman; and David Holmes of Detroit, assistant caucus chairman.

The majority whip's function is to get votes in line for passage or rejection of major legislation. The floor leader sets priorities on the order in which legislative proposals are considered, decides when to adjourn and handles parliamentary procedural items. That position could be strength-need if additional senate reforms are approved, according to Hughes.

Problems are not bite size for county computer division

Changes are in the offing for Oakland County's Computer Services Division.

Three top computer division managers—Ken Patterson, Don Lurnsder, and John Witherup—are on their way to positions outside the computer division, according to centry sources.

As expected, the board of commissioners last week authorized County sources last week authorized County Sources and Computer Technology (SCT) of West Chester, Pa. The volte was 183.

PROBLEMS IN THE computer services division, according to com-missioners and a \$40,000 analysis, have been rampant for several years. "This is not a new problem," Per-

"If done properly," said Novi's Murpy, "SCT will bring in a term of qualified computer management personnel and support to review our total system." That team could include as many as if people.

While the county executive is busy regolating a six month contract with the West Chester, Pa. corporation, commissioners predicted they would be moving to create a new director's position for the computer center. The center has never had been under the direction of a single person respon-


