

# North tops G.C. East for 2d victory

CHURCHILL-HARRISON

North Farmington took an early lead and never faltered, as the Raiders crushed Garden City East, 62-44, to win their Northwest Suburban League opener Friday night.

North jumped in front early and led, 13-8, after one period, then blew the game open in the second quarter, outscoring East, 22-13. Ron Fredericks led the Raider surge, scoring all 12 of his points in the stanza.

North continued to dominate in the second half as all of the team's players scored. The Raiders outpointed East, 27-23, in the third and fourth periods to ensure the win.

Game scoring honors were shared by four players. Fredericks and Mark Biehl for North and Roger Ferguson and Tim Taylor for East each scored 12 points. Mike Kossick added 11 for East.

The victory raised North's record to 2-0 and 1-0 in the league. East is winless in three games thus far, and 0-1 in league competition.

North travels to Walled Lake Central Tuesday for a nonleague game. East will host Livonia Stevenson on Tuesday. Game time for both contests is 8 p.m.

Livonia Churchill, which held Farmington to six points during both the first and third quarters, recorded a 45-42 victory Friday in a Western Six League basketball game.

Karl Eberly led Churchill with 12 points. Brian Burgess and Dave Turnquist scored 14 and 10 points, respectively, for the Hawks.

"The kids played good defense," said Fred Price, coach of the Chargers. "We varied back and forth between a man-to-man and zone defense. In the second half I thought we played excellent defense (with a sagging zone)."

Both teams committed quite a few turnovers, Price said, adding that he was not pleased with his team's performance from the foul line, where the Chargers made nine of 18 shots.

"We must have missed 10 puppies (layups) underneath," Price said.

However, the Chargers' coach praised the defensive work of Dave Krick and Mike Tadovich, the rebounding effort of Ralph Jarrot (14) and Eberly's shooting (10 points in the third quarter).

Lakeland gradually built up a lead that Farmington was unable to overcome, as the Falcons dropped their first Inter-Lakes League game of the season, 77-65, Friday night.

Lakeland led, 17-16, at the end of the first quarter and built its lead to 42-37 at the half. Farmington narrowed that margin to four, 53-49, at the end of three periods but the Falcons ran out of gas in the final quarter.

Farmington's chances for a victory were crippled, when leading scorer Jim Bobey fouled out with six minutes left. Bobey scored 14 points before leaving.

Greg Kuhnlein also scored 14 for the Falcons and Jeff McGrath added 12. Lakeland was led by Jeff DeYoung's game-high 37 points. Gary Glasson hit for 20 and Chuck Seels had 10.

The loss left Farmington with a 1-3 record and 0-1 in the league. Lakeland is 2-1 and 1-0 in the league. Farmington plays at Northville Tuesday in a nonleague encounter.

## S-L beats Groves in league opener

Southfield-Lathrup came back from a ragged first half to trample Birmingham Groves 71-57 Friday night.

"In the first half, both teams were out of control," said Lathrup coach Jim Kourtas. "It looked like the first man who got the ball shot it and prayed."

In the second half, we settled down," he said. "We worked the ball offensively and we rebounded better. It paid off for us."

Guard John Galecki put the ball in the basket four times in the first period to keep the score close. Galecki led Groves in scoring, finishing with 11 points.

The Falcons and the Chargers remained close throughout the second period of the Metro-Suburban League game.

Ron Purns' last dance longshot with one second left put the Falcons ahead 31-30 at halftime.

But Lathrup exploded in the last three minutes of the third quarter, adding 16 points to their side of the

scoreboard. Jack Dalesian, Karl Taylor, Ron Gold and Phil Conroy each contributed four points during the quarter.

Jim McKnight sunk a long shot from the corner with only two seconds left to secure a 50-41 lead for the Chargers.

Groves coach Jay Schwalb pinpointed the third quarter as a turning point in the "Falcons' game." "Three times we took the ball down and then turned it over without taking a shot at bucket," he said. "That turned the tide."

Karl Taylor sunk four more Charger field goals in the fourth quarter, on his way to becoming high point man of the game, with 20 points. He scored on nine field goals and two of three from the free throw line. Conroy and Dalesian both tallied eight points apiece.

Lathrup found the hoop on 31 of 68 attempts for 46 per cent. Groves shot with 33 per cent accuracy, hitting 24 of 73. Lathrup was 53 percent at the free throw line, while Groves had an average of 50 per cent at the line.

Mark McManus and Naim Peres led the Falcons in rebounding, each

pulling down ten and assisting on three more. Dalesian was top rebounder for the Chargers, with ten, followed by McKnight with six rebounds. The teams were tied with 33 rebounds apiece.

"Karl Taylor played a strong game offensively and Dalesian rebounded well," Kourtas said. "A lot of kids played, which is a plus factor for the team. About nine kids are playing pretty regularly."

Lathrup's accurate shooting and Groves' weak defense also contributed to the outcome, he added. "They shot a good percentage from the floor and they got the ball inside more than we'd like," Schwalb said.

"They out-scraped us on the floor," Schwalb added. "We had our moments of glory, but they were just brief moments. The team just didn't play together well."

Groves, now 2-1, will entertain Pontiac Northern Tuesday at 8 p.m.

Lathrup, now 1-1, is looking toward its game with Plymouth Canton at 8 p.m. Tuesday in Southfield.

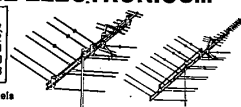

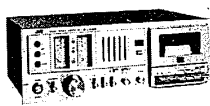
