# In The Pocket

When the doors of the National Hall of Fame are opened by the Women's International Bowling Congress next March, Anita Cantaline, former national all-star champion and captain of the Jac-Ro team in the all star leagues, will be admitted.

With her entry, the Detroit Women's Bowling Association will have six members in the mythical hall that is the goal of all women bowlers.

In past years, Elvira Tepler, Connie Powers, Stella Hartwick, "Eddie" Coy and Louise Stockdale have been honored. No other city association can match that record.

THE PROFESSIONAL WOMEN bowlers are coming back to the metropolitan Detroit area. In a program just announced, the women pros will sponsor one of their national tournaments at Bill Stock's North Hill Lanes in Rochester starting March 3.

OFFTIMES, HIGH SCORES pop up in the most unusual places. This was true during the past week when two barrier-breaking 700s were rolled in junior house leagues.

While the classic at Wonderland was floundering around, Rich Saxton, bowling in the junior house league, rolled games of 224, 255 and 254 for a 733.

Then not far away in the junior house league at Merr-Bowl, Chic Chicousky posted a 762 that included a middle game of 282.

THERE SEEMS TO BE no stopping John Hurley, who has been on a high-scoring rampage at Westland Bowl for the past six weeks.

On the heels of his 815 series two weeks ago and a string of five 700s, he came back this week at Westland Bowl with a 297 game.

Bowling in the doubles, he opened the four-game series with counts of 284

and 224. Then he slumped to 171 but came right back with a string of 11 strikes. On the verge of a perfect game, Hurley left the 3-6-9 on his final ball and had to settle for the 227.

IN KEEPING with the trend of the last month, women played a big part in high scoring during the week.

In the invitational doubles at Merr-Bowl, Polly Cole and Cheryl Mertz waged a great battle for top honors before Polly won with a 597 and a two-pin margin.

Close behind them came Judy Murphy with 582 and June Bach with 567. High game awards went to Jan Coster with 227 and Lucille Mermi with a 224. The best women's score of the week at Merr-Bowl came in the Wednesday league when Virginia Stoll posted a 615.

AT WOODLAND LANES Carol Byron showed the way with a 224 in 146 and Jean Cox had a 220 in 271. Third place went to Judy Santoro with a 560. To top off the high scores, Pat Ruback, a 124 average bowler, rolled a 200 game.

JUDY GRIWICKI set a hot pace in the ladies classic at Westland. She opened with a 228, came back with games of 217 and 202 for a 657.

Her closest rivals were Ruth Worley, who had 221 in 501, Ann Gaus with 665 and Cheryl Antalik with 609. While this group was leading the parade, Barb Meara rolled a 245 for high game.

THE VINCO LEAGUE at Garden Lanes had another close finish. Brad Lackey landed on top with 650 and Rick Winters was next with 632. Then came Bob Meara with 620, Paul Dienbach with 609 and Norm Zielinski with 602.

At Super Bowl, Ron Milnick had a 580 in the Guys and Dolls league and made possible with a 266 game. In the Saturday night league, Jim Hubbs had a 278 in 666 and Wes Shasko had a 265 opener in a 649 series.

BOB BOSS barely missed the automatic membership in the 700 club at Bel-Aire Lanes when he posted a 696 to pace the classic. He started with games of 254 and 239, but dipped to 193 in the final.

Jim Shelp landed in the runner-up spot with 678 and Corey Messer had a 670.

In the Sunday alternates league, Berry Schwab, with an average of 116, came through with a 246 series—128 pins over to establish a new league mark.

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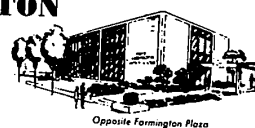
