On snowy white morning, Thomas Farrell gathers wood for the stove in his 19th century New Hampshire shoe fectory. As the small building warms, he begins to transform strips of leather into pitchers, butles and mugs before the eyes of visitors to Dear-born's historic Greenfield Village. The 65-year-old Farmington Hills resident performs his craft three days a week. He is a permanent part-time employee, a position he acquired after retiring from Ford Motor Co, three years ago.

retiring from Ford Motor Co. three years ago. "Some visitors are disappointed if I tell then I haven't been doing this all my life," Farrell said. "They expect i. So I tell them my great-granifather was a harness-maker during the Civil War and the trade was passed down in the family. "Truth is, I taught myself to work with leather after I retired from data processing."

Farrell is a man who likes to tell sto-ries. He winds his way through various tales of old to persons who wander into bis shon

Farrell estimates eight hours of labor goes into construction of one mug. The leather is soaked to become more pliable. Two strips are seen together to form a handle. The rough shape is pressed over a wood or sand moid to give it roand shape. Finally, softer leather is stretched over the bot-mer the entities is stretched over the bot-tor the could pliad gives the mug-its durability, tar is melted into pitch one the rosins, sulfars and turpenline and the leather is dipped into the tar-once the rosins, sulfars and turpenline is burnt out.
