

Tankers shine in AAU meet at Novi High

More than 600 swimmers representing 36 clubs throughout Michigan competed in the Bulldog Aquatic Club AAU swimming meet last weekend.

The Bulldog Aquatic Club of Livonia put together the winning team in the 100-yard medley relay for boys eight years old and under. Jim Kovach, John Grassam, Greg Cooksey and Craig Snyder combined with an effort of 1:15.38.

In the girls' eight-and-under competition, Michelle McKenzie from the Livonia Spartan Aquatic Club, won the 25-yard freestyle with a time of 15 seconds.

The Clarenceville Swim Club won the 400-yard freestyle relay in the girls' 10 and under division. Ann Schlopper, Rachael Klugo, Margaret LaPave and Kathy Piorew put together the winning effort, 4:37.

Alec Campbell won an amazing five events in the boys 11-12 division. Campbell swims for the Clarenceville

Swim Club. He won the 50-yard butterfly, the 200-yard individual medley, the 50-yard freestyle, the 50-yard backstroke and the 200-yard freestyle.

Another member of the Clarenceville team, Paul Larson, won two events in the boys open class. Larson won the 200-yard breaststroke, 2:23.97, and the 50-yard freestyle, 24.3 seconds.

Also, in that boys open division, Chuck Coffman, from the Bulldog Aquatic Club, won the 100-yard butterfly. He clocked 58.6 seconds.

In the girls' open class, Kari Santon dominated all competitors by winning four events. Santon won the 200-yard breaststroke, the 400-yard individual medley, the 200-yard individual medley and the 100-yard butterfly.

Also, in the girls' open, Mary Rozman won the 50-yard freestyle for the Livonia Spartan Aquatic Club, and the team of Beth Nolan, Polly Adamsky, Jackie Cogo and Rozman won the 400-yard medley relay.

In the ladies classic, Fran Cook was high with a 624 and Mary Mohaci was next with 616. Ann Sedock landed third with 614. In the Parents Without Partners league, Don Assenmacher went 140 pins over his average with a 607.

FRED HAMLIN, owner of Farmington Lanes, showed his customers how things are done when he fired a 223 in 630 to pace the Mixed classic. Right behind him came Mike Schweiger with 248 in 621 and Joe Driscoll with a 215 in 618.

ORDINANCE NO. C-437-78

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TRAFFIC CONTROL ORDERS

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

That the Traffic Control Orders issued by the Chief of Police of the City of Farmington, dated February 4, 1977, are hereby amended as follows: Chapter 1, Section 1.11; Chapter 2, Section 2.1; Chapter 5, Section 5.39, as provided in Section 2.53 of the Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships and Villages.

CHAPTER 1 "STOP STREETS" - Delete the following:

Section 1.12 FARMINGTON MEADOWS SUBDIVISION

(a) Tall Oaks and Chestnut, the northeast and southeast corners.

(b) Chestnut at Tall Oaks, the northwest corner.

CHAPTER 2 "YIELD RIGHT OF WAY STREETS" - Add the following:

Section 2.1 FARMINGTON MEADOWS SUBDIVISION

(a) Northwest corner of Chestnut and Tall Oaks

CHAPTER 5 "REGULATIONS PROHIBITING PARKING" - Add the following:

Section 5.39 HERITAGE LANE

(a) Both north and south sides of the street 82 feet west of Drake Road.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on November 20, 1978, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting on December 4, 1978 and will become effective ten days after publication.

ORDINANCE NO. C-438-78

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 5.15 OF CHAPTER 5M, DISORDERLY CONDUCT, OF THE FARMINGTON CITY CODE

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

5.15 MINORS: ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR. No person under the age of twenty-one (21) years shall, in the City, do any of the following:

(1) Purchase, offer or attempt to purchase, have in his possession, or consume any alcoholic beverage.

(2) Bring any alcoholic beverage into any establishment licensed to sell alcoholic beverages.

(3) Furnish any false information or make any false representation as to his age to any law enforcement officer, or to any person in charge of, or employed by, an establishment licensed to sell alcoholic beverages, for the purpose of obtaining a sale of any alcoholic beverage to himself.

(4) Knowingly possess, transport or have under his control in any motor vehicle any alcoholic beverage unless that person is employed by a licensee under the Michigan Liquor Control Act and is possessing, transporting or having such alcoholic beverage in a motor vehicle under his control during regular working hours and in the course of his employment.

(5) It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, assist in the procurement of, provide or furnish to any minor under the age of twenty-one (21), any alcoholic beverage, except upon authority of and pursuant to a prescription of a duly licensed physician.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on November 20, 1978, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting on December 4, 1978, and will become effective ten days after publication.
