"Pour a dab of makeup in the palm of your hand, like color on a palette." she said. "Use fingertips of your other hand to apply with light, short strokes, beginning between the brows and working up and out over forchead toward hairline.

"Then go down the nose and over not the check area, working toward the hairline. Next, from mid-thin toward jaw, being sure to tack foundation under your chin and smooth it off in short, upward strokes so that no line shows."

OTHER NEW additions to the cosmetic line include "Estee Lauder Nights," laced with 14-larat gold and subtle enough to wear in the day-time. In this new line, the most innovative makeup is "Lipshine." It adds a soft glimmer but, unlike many other lig gloss products, your lips do not feel as if you've fallen into a slippery vat of vaseline.
