

Campus Center Renovation Plan Hits Snag

"You tell the architect what you need, and he comes up with a plan to meet them."

Schoolcraft Community College Board of Trustees Chairman Mrs. Jane Moebis then capped her protest against administration's plan to hire an architect immediately to design remodeling of the Waterman Campus Center.

She stalled off a board motion to hire the architect, but not before lengthy debate in which some members first fought her objections.

"We need a specific recommendation before we can move," she insisted, stressing her disapproval of a faculty-administration presentation.

THE PRESENTATION consisted of a statement in the minutes of a building committee meeting: "that the Waterman Campus Center be renovated to handle culinary arts and food services," along with President Eric Bradner's introductory remarks at a trustees' meeting.

Dr. Bradner said the idea is to enlarge the eating area and the cooking area.

He said, "We are now building a larger bookstore, which is scheduled to move out of Waterman May 1; then we will be ready to start remodeling. We should hire an architect to remodel the lower level."

Trustee Clarke Oldenburg entered a motion to hire the architect, but Mrs. Moebis asked, "Where is the student lounge in the lower level going and why? At what cost? We need a specific recommendation before we can move."

SEMCOC Assembly Meeting

Your local government panels that have delegated representatives to the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOC) will have their say today (Oct. 29).

That's the date of the third "general assembly" meeting of SEMCOC of the year. To be held at 1:30 p.m. in the Veterans Memorial Building banquet room in downtown Detroit, the meeting will be comprised of delegates from 107 jurisdictions, including 13 in the Observerland area.

The meeting is open to all local governing bodies and administrative officials within Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Washtenaw and Wayne counties, also.

WILLIAM L. MAINLAND, supervisor of Milford Township and chairman of the general assembly, will moderate.

Agenda items include a review of SEMCOC activities since the May general assembly meeting, a presentation of the 1970 budget, and contribution fees.

It will also include reports on development of regional programs such as public safety, comprehensive health, education, cooperative purchasing and public works.

The Transportation and Land Use Study (TALUS) will also be a matter of discussion.

Ventless Hoods

Trap Grease

Smoke-Laden Air

If you are remodeling your kitchen, the ventless range hood may be the ideal solution to ventilation where duct installation to the outside is a problem.

Ventless hoods have a combination of filters which trap smoke and grease-laden air drawn in by the built-in fan.

The ventless range hood-fan usually is lower in cost than the ducted type. It returns the purified air to the room while the ducted type delivers the smoke and grease-filled air to the outside.

"Before we enlarge the culinary program we'd better provide space for faculty," she said.

Some faculty members are presently squeezed into makeshift offices in former classrooms. Anticipations are that faculty and enrollment will grow next year, without any corresponding increase in facilities.

OLDENBURG ARGUED that "If we don't like the architects' sketches, we don't have to buy them."

Mrs. Moebis said she isn't against hiring an architect; only against hiring one without "a specific plan for me to follow."

Randy Johns, Student Resident president, said from the audience that his group is totally in favor of waiting until some alternatives for location of the student lounge facilities are available.

Red Cross Classes Set Re-training

All water safety instructors, currently authorized by the American Red Cross, are required to complete a mandatory re-training course before the end of the year.

After December, those instructors who do not meet the new requirements, will no longer be eligible to teach Red Cross certified swimming and lifesaving courses.

For the convenience of local residents, the nine-hour training course will be taught at Plymouth High School, 650 Church, Plymouth. Classes will be held three consecutive Thursdays, Nov. 6, 13, and 20 from 7 to 10 p.m. Students must bring bathing suits, as there will be pool activity in all three sessions.

THE COURSE is open to all water safety instructors who hold a current authorization. It is not an instructor refresher or review course.

Pre-registration is required. For further information, call 961-3900, ext. 254, or write the Red Cross at 153 E. Elizabeth, Detroit, 48202.

This re-training course is necessary because of recent changes in Red Cross swimming and lifesaving programs. The textbook, "Swimming and Water Safety," which presents a new philosophy and approach to teaching swimming, will be available at the first class.

Vines Grow Well

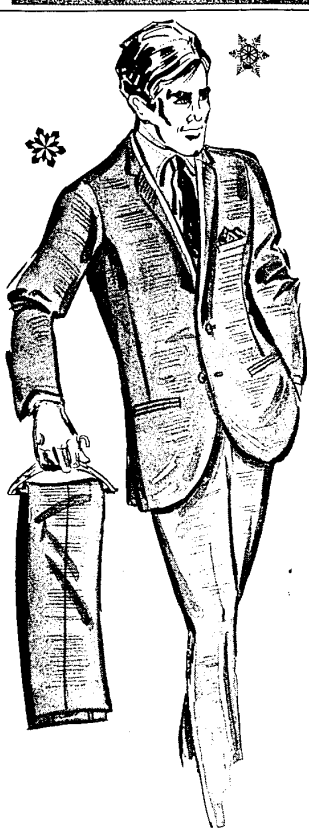
In Window Pots

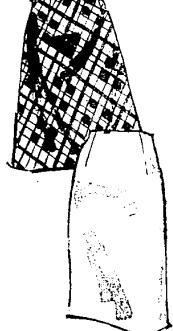
