## Jewish institute to deal with unmet human needs

"Alone Together-Our Jewish Family" is the title given by the women's division of the Jewish Welfare Federation for its 32nd annual institute, scheduled 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 11, in the Jewish Community Center, 6500 W. Maple, West Bloomfield.

Human needs that are not being met, both in the local Jewish community and in Israel, is the focus of the session. Gladys Rosen, program specialist in the Jewish communal affairs department of the American Jewish Committee, will be keynote speaker for the morning session. Her address will be titled "The Family: Alienation and Isolation."

Two panel discussions on the subject of Jewish family life will follow her talk.

One, considering the situation of young adults, single parents and senior adults, will feature Caryl Scheuer and Barbara Gordon of Southfield and Mollie Plizack of Oak Park.

After their discussion, there will be a panel on the community response to family problems. Participants will be

Jacob Cohen, a professor at Brandeis University, will speak following lunch, discussing problems faced by the people of Israel.
