## Woman honored for library work

Mary Allison said she was "just thrilled to pieces."

After 20 years of service on the Farmington Library Board, the Rochester resident has been commended by the Oakland County Board of Commissioners for sharing "her time and effort" on the library's behalf.

Along with the commendation for the library service, the commission also wished her well in future endeavors.

The presentation was made at a recent meeting of the Oakland County Board of Commissioners. Mrs. Allison said she first heard of the award through Marguerite Simson, a board commissioner.

Mrs. Allison lived in Farmington for 23 years before moving to Rochester three and one half years ago. She made the move, she said, so she could get involved in other activities, and, for this reason, does not serve on any local library boards.

She has been an active member of the American Library Association, and served as the secretary of the trustee division of the association. She is presently vice-president of the Rochester Branch of the American Association of Retired Persons, Inc.
