

Chief judge picked

Richard D. Kuhn has been elected chief judge of the Oakland Circuit Court bench by his 13 colleagues. He succeeds Judge Steven Andrews. The judges elected John N. O'Brien first alternate chief judge and Frederick C. Ziem as second alternate. Kuhn will be official spokesman for the Oakland Circuit Court, second largest circuit court in the state. He will represent the court in its relations with the Michigan Legislature, the Oakland

County Board of Commissioners, higher courts and bar associations. A delegate to the Michigan Constitutional Convention of 1961, Kuhn later ran for U.S. Congress in the old 18th District of western Oakland County. He was elected to the bench in 1972. A graduate of Michigan State University, he earned his LL.B. degree from the Detroit College of Law. Judge O'Brien was elected in 1972 and Judge Ziem in 1959.

How about a year of 12 equal months?

Since 1923, there has been a movement afoot toward changing to a new calendar.

The Calendar Council of the League of Nations has worked for years on one that could be accepted by all nations of the world.

But custom, tradition and superstition die hard. Our present method of reckoning the passage of time is — except for a few changes — about 2,000 years old.

The Romans of Caesar's time were able to get used to a new calendar, and the British finally gave up their Julian calendar for the Gregorian one, in spite of bitter opposition. And, most likely, by some time in the 21st century, we will have reformed the calendar once more.

WALLACE BARLOW, an industrial engineer, has formulated one that is being recommended by the present Calendar Reform Foundation.

If it is accepted, this calendar will divide the year into 12 equal months, each containing 28 days. The extra days will be spread over holiday periods at the end of each month.

This will require some radical changes in thinking. For instance, the next day after Sunday, Jan. 28, will not be Monday; it will be a holiday, Winter Festival Day. Then the following day will be Feb. 1 and Monday.

The business week and month would be standardized. This would result in efficiency, productivity and a substantial saving, because it now costs an estimated \$1.5 billion each year in extra accounting adjustments due to the present calendar.

UNDER THE suggested plan, the work year would total 240 days.

We now have a work year of 255 days. Before World War II, the six-day work week was common, and only six holidays were usually given, making a total of 307 business days a year.

We usually think of ourselves as more fortunate than the overworked serfs of the Middle Ages. However, although they did work longer hours, they observed 115 religious holidays in Europe, plus 52 Sundays, leaving only 198 work days a year.

No matter what the calendar says, witches will undoubtedly go on reckoning the days of their sabbaths in relationship to the vernal and autumnal equinox, and the winter and summer solstices, as they have ever done, and probably ever shall.

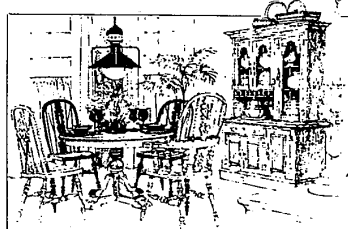
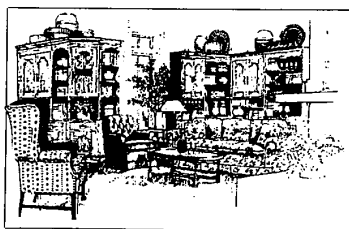
