A recent U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) survey found that fewer than one-third of the country's food shoppers actually know how to read labels and use the information they find

bels and use the information they find there.

But there is some information you should expect to find on food containers, according to the FDA.

Nutrition labeling should contain the amounts of calories, protein, carbohydrates, fat, vitamins and minerals for each serving.

Most persons seem to understand the listing of carbohydrates, fats and calories. However, a source of confusion appears to be the section containing the per cent of U. S. Recommended Dietary Allowance (USRDA) for vita-

mins, minerals and protein.

To help you understand the USRDA, here are a few facts you should know:
"The USRDA his defined as the daily amount of vitamins, minerals and protein established by the FDA as essential for maintaining good nutrition.
"There are USRDA's for four categories of persons—adults and children 4 or more years of age, infants, children under 4, and pregnant and lactating women.

The USRDAs stated on a particular package depend upon which of the above population groups the food is intended for.

Some consumer advocates feel nutrition labels should list only calories, fat and cholesterol. Others insist that these labels should be lengthened to include all factors contributing to good nutrition.


