These are Merrick's and the VIP Palace, both in Southfield; Pacifico's Pasta Village and Bonaventure, both in Troy, and New King Lim's in Auburn Heights.

Others participating are Paradiso Cafe and La Place, both in Detroit; Boars Head and Crabbie Joe's, both in Dearborn; Pat O'Grady's in St. Clair Shores; Old German in Ann Arbor, Sir George's in Taylor; and Old Fish Market in Windson.
