Wiener, at 19, is the creative hand behind his family's Ari Art Company.
Ari is Wiener's middle name.
Now, a Michigan State University freshman majoring in commercial art, Wiener began creating original T-shirt designs last year as a West Bloomfield High School senior.
"My little brother got a gift for his birthday-a T-shirt with his name writen all over if." Wiener described. "I thought, I can do that," and began making personalized shirts first for friends, then for friends of the charged 45 for a shirt which took.

"It's really a pressure business and very competitive," he said. "It's pretty cut throat when you get up to the big business level. I was kind of turned off by the dishonesty."
"Whatever happened to thinking of the customer as number one?"
Wiener, his parents and two brothers are partners in the fleedging company. His father Irv, a teacher, lends financial expertise and sales leads, which

"The salesman part of it I really can't get into," Wiener says. "It's kind of hard, especially when you're just a kid anyway. I would just like to design."

"My dad says it would be nice to make enough to pay for my college. But seeing other people wear it, seeing it just around, it getting just payment." He is not now considering continuing the business after college.

SO FAR, Wiener's biggest hit is a fly-

ing robot holding a football, which can be made up as "The Big Green Machine" or The Wolverine Machine" or to promote any college or high school sports team. "They are available at Ann Arbor and East Lansing bookstores. His ideas, aimed at the teen market,

His ideas, aimed at the teen market, are based on school promotion or current events. "I'm always looking for new ideas-for the one which could be the big one."

He acknowledges a shirt featuring a defiant test tube baby has not won universal acclaim. Then there were shirts designed for some local teen chubs, which Wiener had a hassle getting printed up on in time for a convention. "When I picked up the piles of shirts, they weren't dry. The stuff from the back came off on the fronts. They had to be re-done."

Cold weather can put your car on the skids.

Here's how to get the best mileage, performance and economy from your car without putting your budget on thin ice.
