"We couldn't open earlier because we didn't have snow. Our phones were ringing constantly, Everyone wanted to know when the season would begin. One man wanted to know why we couldn't use a snow machine.

"Seriously, there has to be at least a
five inch base over the course so that it
isn't rained," Justis said, First time skiers are welcome, even encouraged with
such offerings as beginners instruction
classes (\$3 for adults, \$2 for children)
and complete equipment rentals (\$4.50
for adults and \$3 for children under 12).
A \$10 deposit is required on all rented
equipment.

The cost of ski rental includes use of the facility. For persons with their own ski equipment, the cost is \$2 for adults and \$1 for children.

Justis said the season will run as long as there is snow on the ground.
