"Over the year's of this club's existance, it has given more than \$500,000 to Farmington in service," "One thing for sure is that if you can way everything in this community that the Jaycees did, you would find many bare spots."

Lest year was an ambilious one for the young men's organization. It raised and donated more than \$30,000 to the Farmington community. It contributed \$10,000 toward a total commitment of \$50,000 to the Farmington YMCA building fund.

Other projects for which the Farmington Area Jaycees are well known are the Walk for Farmington, the Holoween Haunted House, Christimas tree sale and the Wild Wheelle Weekend.

For years the group sponsored the Western Code during the Farmington Founders Pestival.

Other activities have included projects for sealor citizens, purchase of exercise equipment for the local police and fire departments, community garage sale, contributions to the Ann Arbor Burn Center and Muscular Dystrophy and the Easter egg hunt.
