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# Series probes options for your aging parents

"The adult children of aging parents often have many more options than they realize."
That's the opinion of Sydery Belier of Oakland University's Continuum Center, who will lead a sinsession program called "You and Your Aging Parent" to be held 7-10 pm. Wednesday, Feb. 21 to March 28, at Oakland University. Mrs. Reiter of Southfield, coordinator of the Gerontology Training Project at the center, designed the program with her co-leader, Adele Weaver of West Bloomfield, a counselor and trainer at the center.

The program was designed under grants by the National Institute of Mental Health and the Administration on Aging as sport of a series of older adult instration on Aging as part of a series of older adult

istration on Aging as part of a series of older adult programs that won creative programming awards from the National University Extension Associa-tion in 1977.

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"WE ARE TRYING to help men and women who are concerned about their aging parents on several levels," Mrs. Reiter said. "Some are just beginning to notice that their parents are getting older and the future.

"Others are overwhelmed the future.
"Others are overwhelmed to the future of help they should give and how can they give it." Some adults have very old independent parents, but they still wonder whether they are doing what's right for them.
