Bella Abrug believes her recent firing as chairman of the National Advisory Committee for Women stemmed from political rather than personality conflict with President Carter.

The former congresswoman told a gathering of 300 terminists at the Radisson Cadillac Tuesday Carter was "covering up" when he issued a statement that the dismissal was prompted by a personality clash.

"What he did'dit like was what I had to say about his economic policies," she stated. "Inflation is hurting the poor and working people, and Carter is ask ing those who are already deeply burdened to become more so.
