number almost 5.000. The passage or defeat of the issue may hang on the decisions of 281 registered voters in Quakertown and 281 in Wood Creek Farms. If the voters disapprove of consolidation in either of the villages, it will be defeated. The strongest indication of a heavy turnout for Tuesday comes from Wood Creek Farms. The vil-lage clerk. Mrs. Dan Abbott. said 61 more voters reg-istered for the special election on consolidation than for the village elections last March. Quakertown's registration have increased

Quakertown's registration have increased about 20 since the last election, according to Mrs. Clifton Strasser, Quakertown village clerk. Villages officials will also be elected Tuesday in Contracture

Viniges officials will also be elected Tuesday in Quakertown. Farmington City Manager John Dinan said reg-istrations in the city are up about 10 per cent from the last election. However, he attributed the increase to the city's normal increase in population. In the township, fewer are registered for Tues-day's consolidation election than for the most recent

day's consolidation election than for the most recent election. Registrations total about 88,400 compared to about 10,000 in 1988. The 20 meetings or debates concerning consoli-dation lead observers to speculate that favorable weather could lead to a large turnout. Filing of petitions asking for an election on a city annexation of township territory and in-corporation of the township also may increase the number of votes cast. Dinan predicted as much as 350 per cent turnout and the clerks noted they also expect a large turnout.

# City For People

(On Nov. 4, Farmington Area residents will be asked to choose whether a nine-man chorter commission shall write a charter to combine the four governmental units into a single, new city. A reason why a charter commission should be given the chance to explore the benefits af consolidation is given below in the final in a series of articles on what a single city means.)

gle city means.) The people have made the Farmington Area one community and now seek unity in fact by consolidating its four separate governments into a single new city. A single government for the Farmington Area means better roads, increased police and fite protection, and a single plan to meet tomorrow's needs. If the community gools its revenues and resources, the peo-ple can be led by a professional government which will have the tools to redeveloped worn-out areas in the community. By eliminating competition and petty bickering, a sin-gle city stands in a better position to improve its tax base by attracting a healthful balance of industry, business and people.

by attracting a healthful balance of industry, business and people. A single council's control over revenues and expenditures and a consolidation more efficient taxation and fuller use of each tax dollar. And cossidiation means protection of the present Farmington Area from annexation attempts which could rob the community of its valiable resources. A single city can provide services and leaders to meet the needs of people, by serving people best, a single city would best meet the goal of government. That is the substance of consolida-tion.
