Comedy Joins Bill On Will-O-Way Stage

The Neil Simon comedy, "Star Spangled Girl," has joined the repertory at the Will-O-Way Theater in Bloomfield Hills.

Studio Moves Into Theater This Season

The Studio Company of Oakland University's Academy of Dramatic Art will move into Meadow Brook Theatre four nights during each week that the John Fernald Company is performing in Detroit.

This will be the first week of each month except January and April.

Five plays will be presented, starting Nov. 5 through 8 with "Under Milk Wood" by Dylan Thomas and concluding in late April-early May with "The Contrast" by Royall Tyler.

Two Shakespeare productions and a triple bill of one-acts by Wilder, Ionesco and Shaffer also will be performed on the professional company's "home" stage.

The Studio Company is composed of graduating members of the academy, which is the acting school that shares directors and artists-teachers with the repertory company. Both are directed by John Fernald, former principal of the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in London.

The comedy joins the musical, "The Apple Tree," in playing at the theater Tuesday through Sunday. The third play of the repertory, Murray Schisgal's "Luv," is scheduled to open Nov. 18. Curtain time is 8:30 p.m.

Members of the "Girl" cast are: Gloria Pearson of Farmington as Sophie Rauschmeyer; Gary Graham as Andy Hobar; and Bill Todd as Norman. All are also in the cast of "Apple Tree."

"Star Spangled Girl" (talks to the younger generation with some candid comments about "saying something important" and "relating.") The two young men are publishers of an underground magazine, going rapidly broke as they probe the larger issues of the day without the benefit of advertisers.

Its heroine is truly an all-American star spangled girl, homey as apple pie and quite a match for the energetic if somewhat misdirected males who vie for her attention.

The production is directed by Alex Gray, well-known Canadian-British actor, director and producer, who is currently marking time in this assignment while awaiting his permanent resident visa before assuming duties as administrative director of Oakland University's Academy of Dramatic Art.

Sandburg Is Star Of Schoolcraft Show

There were three actors on stage last week at Schoolcraft College, but it was a one-man show as the German town Theatre presented "The World of Carl Sandburg."

The star of the show was the famous American poet and author-Carl Sandburg. Certainly actors, Leonard Valenta and Kenneth Middleton, and actress Katharine Minihart, contributed to the staging, but the evening was Sandburg's. INCLUDED in the program were parts of Sandburg's poems, ballads and books along with some engaging glimpses of his personality and manner of viewing the world.

It's hard work to stage a program of almost two hours with little action and hold the audience's attention, but the Guild members succeeded. There were four chairs on stage. Each one of the three cast members had a spot-which was used as a sort of home base.

The fourth chair? That had a double meaning. The chair was used as a stage area for some of the presentation, but it was also Sandburg's chair. Valenta introduced the audience to this factor, when he explained that "we certainly can't fill his chair, but we can use the

guitar."

THE PLAYERS have a light touch for the subject matter and while Sandburg is held in great esteem by the cast members the audience is never allowed to forget that the author had a sense of humor-especially about himself.
