Faith Choirs Battle Noise And Time To Cut Record

In spite of lumbering trucks, roaring bulldozers and time marching on too fast, the combined choirs of Faith Lutheran Church, Livonia have put together a stereo record they'll have ready for Christmas giving.

"Our Faith Sings" is the title. The trucks and bulldozers kept things pretty noisy along Five Mile, where the church is located.

"There was so much noise outside that we had to record some of the numbers over and over," said Mrs. Maria Schmitz, choir director and organist at Faith. "We even picked up some sounds of airplanes and had to redo some of the anthems."

And of course the choirs had to race time since there are all too few weeks between the time they rehearse in Sep-

tember after the summer months and a recording date that would permit the record to go on sale in mid-November.

BUT THE NEW album of outstanding numbers done by three choirs now is in the hands of commercial processors and will be dressed in its attractive jacket for sale within a few weeks.

Joining in the production were the senior choir, with 45 members, a teen choir of 30 voices and a junior choir numbering 45.

One special Easter number includes the whole Faith congregation.

Mrs. Schmitz said the anthem, "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today," in an arrangement by Frank Campbell-Watson, had been performed at Easter with

special effects on organ, trumpets and timpani.

"The people of the congregation joined in at the end," Mrs. Schmitz said. "This fall, when we made the recording, the congregation stayed a whole hour after church until we got it right."

THE RECORDING also includes a Telemann cantata, Psalm 117, with special effects by two violins, two violas, two cellos and organ. Several Livonians were guest artists for that number.

The teen choir, all students in the 10th through 12th grades, included an anthem written especially for the group by Mrs. Schmitz. It's titled "You Hold Me In Your Hand, O God," and accompaniment is on three guitars.
