



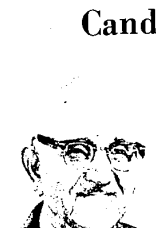

What Can Be Done

Tupper Tells Charter Ideas

I am not going to dwell on the pros and cons of consolidation. Numerous articles in the local paper have discussed the issues and many words have been spoken about it. I support consolidation and as a city candidate for the charter commission, I would like to present some of my ideas that would make up the new charter.

Concerning our city powers: They should include all powers as directed by Act 279 of Public Act dated 1969.

ON ELECTIONS: The elections should be held on a non-partisan basis and the area one ward. There are many possibilities concerning the council.

I favor either a seven or nine-man council with one acting as mayor. I would also consider the possibility of having the mayor elected as a separate office. The balance of the elections would follow those rules required by law.

ON ORGANIZATION OF GOVERNMENT: I favor a city manager type of government with a weak

mayor. If the mayor is not elected separately, he should then be elected along with a mayor pro tem by open ballot at the first council meeting following the election.

The duties of the mayor should be to preside over council meetings, he would vote on all matters but not have veto power. He would be able to call a state of emergency or impose a curfew and this power should be as liberal as the state law allows. Only the council should be elected, all other offices to be appointed according to ability. The city manager is responsible to the city council and his duties would include direction and supervision of all workings of the city.

UNDER GENERAL FINANCE: I believe all expenditures should be worked with a budget except for bonding and special assessments.

As for Taxation: I feel we need a limitation of 20 mills and I would not accept limitation un-

der 15 mills. My opinion of this limitation is based on the fact that any governmental body should have the authority to levy taxes which are commensurate to the services desired by its constituents. This in no way means that the millage should be higher than needed to maintain this level of services.

Other areas that I feel need to be dealt with include the following:

1. The establishment of record keeping, that is to correlate the different methods of existing municipal procedures now established in the villages, township and city.
2. The extent of liability.
3. The pending legislation concerning buildings, land use, etc.
4. The agreements and/or contracts now existing in the four municipalities.
5. The borrowing regulations and powers in relationship to the new population and growth factor.
6. The methods of taxation.

SPECIAL ATTENTION should be given the following:

1. Special assessment district: This should be set up so that areas not required to implement improvements such as sidewalks and street lights where this would be unwarranted due to the makeup of the area.
- Also, not to impose a requirement upon the general fund requiring areas that now have these improvements to subsidize these

advantages unless the area collectively supports them and is willing to pay for them.

2. Sound ordinances which will reflect the desires of the total community.

3. Recreational provisions which at this time are not dealt with specifically in any of the four municipalities.

4. Business district: Many of our neighbors do not have the advantage that we have with a nucleus which can be referred to as downtown. This area must be improved.

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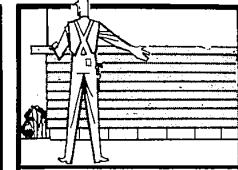
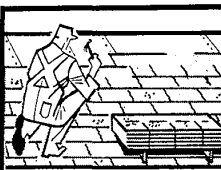
