Girl Scout To See Apollo 12 Launching

Girl Scout Sue Davies of Plymouth is planning a trip that should have many a scientist in this area green with envy.

As the invited guest of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, she's going to Cape Kennedy for the Nov. 14 launching of Apollo 12.

The Plymouth High School senior, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Donald Davies, received her NASA invitation earlier this month, and the Davies home at 585 S. Sheldon has been buzzing with preparations ever since.

"WE WERE ALL just thrilled--and very surprised--when the Huron Valley Council of Girl Scouts called and asked if Sue would like to represent them," Mrs. Davies said.

"I couldn't believe it," said the young traveler.

Sue, 17, and Diantha Davis of Ypsilanti are the only Girl Scouts in Michigan to receive the invitations, and they will be among 50 senior Girl Scouts in the United States to have official places at the launching.

It's believed to be the first time young people have been invited to sit in the VIP section for such an occasion.

"The Citrus Council of Girl Scouts in that area made the original arrangements," Sue said. "I guess in choosing who would go in Michigan, they just pulled the Huron Valley Council out of a hat."

SUE AND DIANTHA will fly to Florida together Nov. 12, arriving at the McCoy Airport in Orlando.

They'll be guests of families whose daughters are seniors in the Citrus Council.

A tour of the Kennedy Space Center is planned on Nov. 13, and the view of the space shot comes the following day. They'll be flying home Saturday, Nov. 15.

Sue and Diantha have met before--five years ago as fellow campers at Girl Scout Camp Linden.

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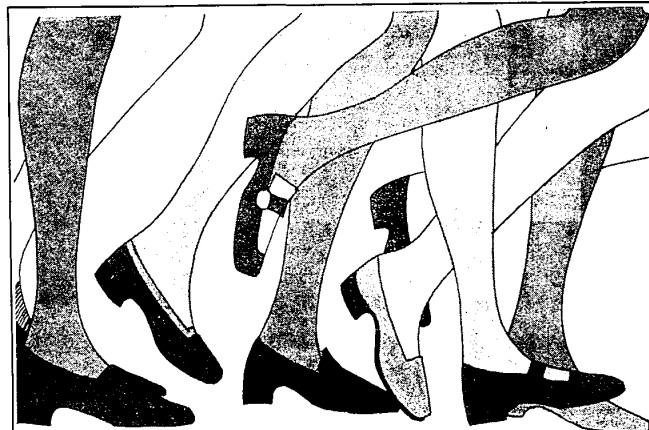
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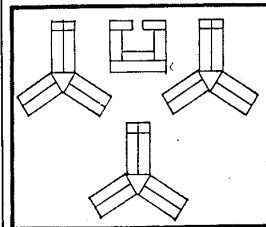
