Lighting of yesteryear featured at museum

Whale oil lamps, kerosene lamps, brass candle holders and some tin wire used for lighting in the 1700s, are part of the "Early American Lighting" display in Plymouth Historical Museum. The special show will continue through March in the museum at 156 S. Main, open 1-4 p.m. Thursday, Saturday and Sunday. Admission is \$1 for adults; 50 cents for those from 12-17; and 25 cents for children from 5-11. Special educational tours may be arranged in advance by calling the museum at 455-9940. Some of the more uncommon items in the display are a bird cage holder, 1700s; an iron dresser from the 19th century; a pewter miner's lamp used in 1800; and a rush light with candle holder used in the 17th century. There is also a tinder box, from the 1800s, which contains the strike, matches, flint and snuffer, and a lard lamp used around 1850. Many railroad lamps are on display, as well as 18th century English brass candle holders. Among the fairy lamps is a very unusual pink and crystal Clarke fairy lamp, which sits on a cut glass pedestal. The whale oil lamps, made by the Boston and Sandwich Companies, include the Sandwick loop, three Printie Block, six-paneled flutes, blown font, eye and scales, patterns. There are also two exceptional lace-maker lamps of the Steigle type.
