145,102 see PGA

The "Monster" may have been tamed during PGA week, but that didn't hurt the attendance or revenue for Oakland Hills.
PGA officials yesterday afternoon said Oakland Hills attendance set a tournmaent record—despite inclients westerday afternoon said Oakland Hills attendance set a tournmaent record—despite inclient weather—for a golf event. Reports released Sunday indicated that 145,102 persons came to Oakland Hills during the week. The previous record was 114,252 for the 1972 PGA on the same course.
Spectators by day were: 3,572 Monday; 7,061 Tuesday; 18,742 Wednesday; 20,264 Thursday; 25,526 Friday; 34,368 Salurday, and 35,569 Sunday.
And those figures translate to added income via programs, bot dogs and beer sold during the week. Don Graham, director of Oakland Hills Finance Committee, said, "This PGA will be more profitable than the 1972."
Proceeds from the 1972. PGA were used to build an addition to the club bouse.
Graham estimated that Oakland Hills would gross \$2.25 million from the event. This amount comes from tickets, advertising in the program and parking.
Major expenses because of the tournament

comes from tickets, advertising in the program and parking. Major expenses because of the tournament will come from making repairs to the north course, where cars were parked, according to Graham. Graham also said that extensive maintenance work must be done to the south course, where the championship was held.

Graham said it was too early to estimate how much money Oakland Hills would gain from the championship.
