According to the police ac-count, a young male entered the store with the shotgun and ordered employes Robert Childs and Phyllis Harris and a customer, Mrs. Dorothy Pridmore, behind the service counter.

He then told Childs to put money from the cash register into a paper bag.

AT THIS POINT, police said, Steven Temby and Joan Pheney entered the store to shop. The gunmen told Childs

into a rear room and had them
lie on the floor, whereupon he


